Sabre Carried By American In Invasion Of Canada Returned

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP) - A sabre carried by a soldier of the American continental army on an invasion of Canada in 1775 was returned to the United States Monday. The presentation was made at a luncheon marking the opening here of National Newspaper Week and honoring Benjamin Franklin, founder of The Montreal Gazette which was first published June 3, 1778. Editor-in-chief Edgar A. Collard of The Gazette presented the battle-battered sabre to the Poor Richard Club during a luncheon attended by more than 200 newspaper, advertising, printing, radio and television executives. WORLD EXAMPLE Speakers included Health Minister Paul Martin of Canada, who said the good relations between Canada and the U.S. "provide an example to all the world of the triumph of goodwill over these elements that create discord between peoples." "I return this sword to you today," Collard said "without any fear that it will ever again be used against us. The sword is now old and battered. But may you hold it here, in the Poor Richard Club of Philadelphia, as an evidence of the truth for which Franklin always stood-the truth that civilization must prevail in this troubled world, and in the end it will be found by all mankind, as he believed, that the pen is indeed mightier than the sword." Martin said ever since its establishment 175 years ago, "The Montreal Gazette has remained true to the ideals which Benjamin Franklin expressed." The paper, Martin added, has gained the respect of Canadians regardless of politics.

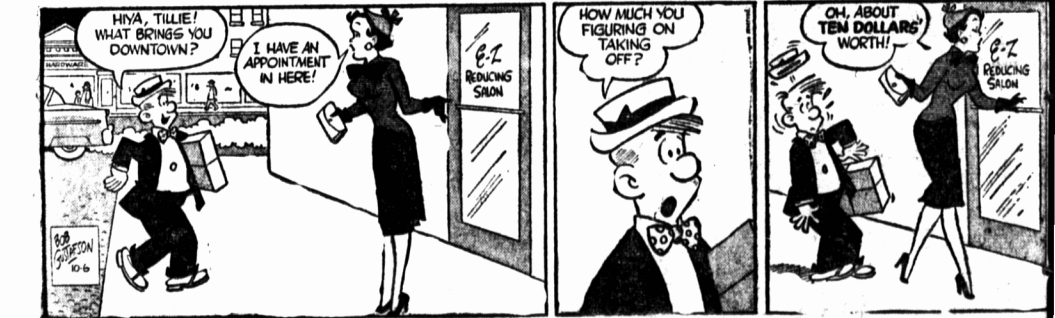
