Wins Scholarship

Top award of the Halifax Music Festival the Senior scholarship of \$500, has been awarded to Basil Phillips of Acadia University Wolfville, N.S. Mr. Phillips a native of Charlottetown displayed amazing violin virtuosity. This second year Arts student astounded the adjudicators with a flawless performance. The scholarship is awarded to a student who has achieved high marks at the Festival and intends to continue advanced study leading to a career in music and must study in some large centre such as New York, London, Toronto, etc. This is the largest student scholarship given at any Canadian Festival.

Mr. Phillips, violinist has been chosen to represent the Halifax region at the Regional Festival to be held in Saint John in May.

Grain Assistance:—"Whereas Freight Assistance on Western Grain has been a great factor in keeping production costs lower on the farm, and whereas the farmers income is gradually disappearing, Be it therefore resolved that we petition the Dominion Government through the Canadian Federation of Agriculture to make this policy of freight assistance on Western feed grain, a permanent policy."

Resolved: That this meeting go on record supporting the Dairy Farmers of Canada with their recommendation to continue a support price of .58 cents per pound on butter.

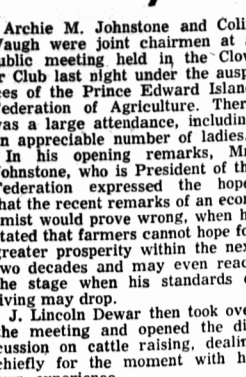
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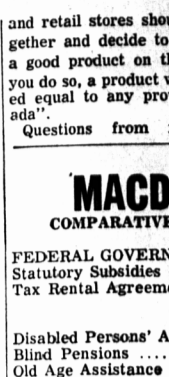

From a study of these figures you will note that there has been a substantial increase in the present year's tax revenue for next year 1954-55 and the current year. This increase is due entirely to the fluctuation of the gross national product and the population for the periods under review.

The Supply proposed to be granted to Her Majesty involves expenditures on ordinary Account of \$8,584,333., and these we now submit for your consideration. This represents an increase over the forecast for the current year by an amount of \$365,869.

GRANTS TO GENERAL HOSPITALS

Grants to General Hospitals are estimated at \$150,000., and some \$22,840. is requested for the Division of Public Health Nursing. These are a few of the proposed specific votes for the fiscal year 1956-57.

PUPILS TRANSPORTATION

The current expenditure proposed for the Department of Education comes to \$1,466,480., an increase of \$117,408. over the appropriation for the present fiscal year.

AGRICULTURE

The Department of Agriculture, which has assumed certain services formerly administered by the Department of Industry and Natural Resources, and in keeping with the Government's intention to provide increased agricultural services, require for the forthcoming fiscal year a total of \$500,320. on Current Account.

HIGHWAYS

The largest departmental allotment, as in previous years, is for the Department of Highways where provision is made for expenditures on Ordinary and Capital Accounts totalling \$4,257,000., an increase of \$653,420. over the present fiscal year's appropriation.

DEVELOPMENT LOANS

Development Loans of \$3,911,200. Offsetting this Capital Expenditure will be Capital Receipts, referred to above, leaving a net Capital disbursement for the coming year of \$2,926,200.

CONCLUSION

Mr. Speaker, I have placed our financial operations squarely before the House and while so doing, have warned the Members, and through them the people, that we must exercise the greatest caution in the spending of our money for both Current and Capital purposes.

CAPITAL ESTIMATES

The estimated receipts for the year total \$985,000. (Federal contribution toward the cost of Hospital Construction \$95,000.; for Highway Projects, including trans-Canada Highway, \$900,000.)

EXPENDITURES

Capital Expenditures, etc., and advances for fisheries and industrial promotion purposes recommended for the next fiscal year, are as follows: Highway Construction \$800,000. Gravelled Roads \$500,000. Permanent Roads \$1,150,000. Culverts 50,000. Bridges 150,000.

CONSTRUCTION

Wood Islands Completion of Park and Provincial Exhibition Association 10,000. Land Purchase - Town Planning 1,000. Farm Improvement Machinery 13,000. Fisheries Development General Hospitals Construction 40,000. P. E. I. Industrial Corporation - Forecast Operating Loss 1955-56 40,200. Rural Electrification 250,000. for a total Capital and Extraordinary Expenditure; and Promotion
