Mr. Kellock, a native of Perth, Ont., was the commissioner who inquired into the Noronic disaster that claimed 119 lives in Toronto harbor. Millions of dollars a year as well as hours of work are at stake in the railway dispute, in which he alone is the final arbitrator.

N. Y. Estate Heirs Decide to Contact Attorney General

Hon. W.E. Darby, Attorney General, will be asked to investigate the Edwards estate in New York, reportedly valued at three billion dollars, on behalf of heirs in this Province. It was decided at a meeting of those interested, held in Summerside on Thursday night.

The investigation will centre about the activities of one Victor O. Montney, Detroit, self appointed "director" of the estate who has been contacting heirs in this Province and has reportedly been sending out general charts and requesting donations of \$74 each for attorney's expenses in getting application claims filed.
