Few of any of the boxing critics here think Olson, an efficient, if unspectacular performer, will lose to the amiable challenger from France.

Most believe it will be close, this time defence of the title by balding Bobo, and many think it might develop into an entertaining engagement for the local fans and a countryside television audience.

The fight goes on in San Francisco's Cow Palace at 10 p. m. EST.

Yanks Favored In Zone Davis Cup Finals

BRISBANE, Australia (AP)—Vic Seixas and Tony Trabert are heavily favored to give America victory over Sweden in the inter-zone Davis Cup tennis finals starting here Thursday, despite the sparkling form and brash confidence of the European champions.

"The devil may be impressed but not I," said 29-year-old Lennart Bergelin. "I have beaten better players than these two Yanks." Bergelin and Sven Davidson, for whom the world is a tennis court, are Sweden's nominees to try to pull one of the major court upsets of all time by whipping the Americans in a best-of-five series on the Milton court Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Two singles matches are scheduled for Thursday, the doubles Friday and the final two singles Saturday. The victors qualify to meet Australia in the challenge round in Sydney Dec. 27-29.

The Swedes' experiences in practice have been so sharp that many observers are predicting a surprise for the Yanks, whose captain Bill Talbert, is out on a limb with a forecast of a 5-0 American sweep.

LONDON, (CP)—Canada placed second in the 1953 King George V Trophy competition for boys' rifle shooting, won by South Africa for the 20th consecutive time and the 24th time in all.

South Africa scored an average 88.50 out of a possible 100 for its 2,000 boys, compared with Canada's 85.35 average.

A Coronation, Alta., cadet corps No. 674, won the Lord Milner Trophy awarded the unit best using the 22-calibre rifle with open sights.

Third place in the Earl Jellicoe sword event for the best large senior unit went to No. 30 Mount St. Louis cadet corps, Montreal.

Canadian competitors won the individual high scores with 116 silver and bronze medals, compared with Britain's 80, next best.

Braves' Owner Denies Report

WELLESLEY, Mass. (AP)—Owner Lou Perini of the National League Milwaukee Braves Tuesday night denied a report that he was negotiating for purchase of Ottawa's International League franchise.

The Ottawa French-language newspaper Le Droit had a "spokesman" for Perini as saying the wealthy Boston contractor wants to buy the Ottawa franchise, now held by Kansas City Athletics of the American League. The Athletics have indicated they are unwilling to operate the triple-A franchise in Ottawa next year.

Perini, at his home here, said in commenting on the report: "We are not negotiating for the Ottawa franchise. We feel it has fine possibilities for development, but we already have one triple-A ball club in Toledo and are very happy there. We don't have enough triple-A players to staff another club."

Milwaukee Braves Seeking Ottawa's I. L. Franchise

OTTAWA (CP)—Louis B. Perini, owner of Milwaukee Braves of the National League, Tuesday was reported interested in buying Ottawa's International Baseball League franchise.

"Everything is still pretty much in the embryonic stage," one informant said. "However, Perini has written Tommy Gorman signifying his interest in purchasing the franchise."

Gorman, Ottawa sports promoter holds the capital's baseball territorial rights and the lease on Lansdowne Park, home of the Ottawa Athletics.

The franchise is up for sale by Kansas City Athletics as a result of the recent American League shift of Philadelphia A's to Kansas City.

"I have had some correspondence with Mr. Perini," Gorman said. "But beyond that I would not like to say anything."

The informant said one reason the wealthy Boston contractor is interested in Ottawa's triple-A franchise is that he has extensive business interests in Canada.

"He apparently feels that it would be a good thing for him to have an International League club in Ottawa," the informant said.

Milwaukee, which now has a triple-A farm club at Toledo, an American Association city, already has a toe-hold in Canada with its class-C Quebec City club of the Provincial League.

Reports of Perini's interest, further clouded the situation on the Ottawa franchise.

Two Imports Fired By Toronto Argos Sizzling

TORONTO (CP)—Two of the 13 imports fired by Toronto Argonauts in an unprecedented mass house-cleaning Tuesday sizzled with indignation and demanded their release from the Big Four football club.

Quarterback Nobby Wirkowski, who led the league in pass completion percentage last season, and Dick Carpenter, an assistant playing coach, described as a "raw deal" the Argonauts' plans not to invite any of the 1954 Americans back for next season in order to make way for \$150,000 worth of new imports.

The disclosure by team director Harry Sunshine Monday night of Argonauts' intentions caught the players and Toronto fans by surprise. It was further evidence that the once-powerful Argonauts, who failed to make the Big Four playoffs the last two seasons after winning the Grey Cup in 1952, are going all out to build a winner again.

A-P-C Statistics

Both said the 13 deported imports should be given their outright releases so that they may try to catch on with another team. Carpenter said "they aren't even giving us a chance to make the team."

"If that is the way the club feels, it is all right with me," Wirkowski said. "I would like to stay in the back and come back to play against the Argonauts. I'd like to show the club and the fans who don't like me that I'm not as bad a quarterback as they think."

Rangers Try New Starting Time

NEW YORK, (CP)—New York Rangers will experiment with 7 o'clock starting times in their Sunday National Hockey League games of Jan. 9 and Feb. 13, it was announced Tuesday. The usual starting times for Sunday games at Madison Square Garden is 8:30.

Announcement was made by John Reed Kilpatrick, president of the Garden, at a hockey luncheon. Montreal Canadiens will be the visiting club on both sides.

Decision to try out the new time was made following a survey of the 12,000 fans who attended a Canadiens game at the Garden Dec. 8. "More than half of them returned the cards we passed out," said Kilpatrick, "and the majority of those voting were for a change."

For starting times the Rangers fans were given a choice between 3 p.m., 7 p.m. and the present 8:30 p.m.

Dodgers Sign Young Pitcher

BROOKLYN (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers Tuesday signed Sanford (Sandy) Koufax, an 18-year-old left-handed pitcher attending the University of Cincinnati, as a bonus player for a reported \$20,000. He will report with the other Dodgers at Vero Beach, Fla. March 1.

Koufax, 6-foot-2 and a 210-pounder, is a Brooklyn-born boy who was signed by Al Campanis. He is the only Dodger now classified as a bonus player.

N. Y. Giants Sign, Sell Players

NEW YORK (AP)—Third baseman Hank Thompson Tuesday signed a reported \$20,000 contract with the New York Giants for the 1955 season and pitchers Charley Fowler and Alex Konowski were sold by the world champions to their Minneapolis farm club of the American Association.

Thompson was a star in the Giants' world series sweep over Cleveland and a .263 hitter during the regular season with 26 home runs and 86 runs batted in.

Kiner Signs Contract

CLEVELAND (AP)—Outfielder Ralph Kiner, former National League home-run king, signed his 1955 contract with Cleveland Indians Tuesday and voluntarily took a pay cut he told a reporter amounted to "about 40 per cent."

His pay next season will be around \$40,000.

Under baseball rules, Kiner was protected against a cut of more than 25 per cent in the reported \$60,000-\$65,000 salary Chicago Cubs of the National League paid him last season. The Tribe purchased him last month.

Hockey School Sessions Continue; Ends Tonight

Sessions of the Sixth Annual Hockey Coaches' and Referees' School continued at the Charlotte-town Hotel yesterday afternoon and evening with referee-in-chief of the NHL Carl Voss, Johnny Squabriggs and Hickey Nicholson being the instructors. Local director, Bill Reid introduced the instructors, and thanked them for their assistance to the instruction period of the three-day Maritime school.

The first session of the day started at 2:00 p.m. and continued till 3:30 with ACSHL referee Johnny Squabriggs leading the discussion on the "Fundamental Skills of Hockey," such as skating, stick handling, shooting the puck and passing. Mr. Squabriggs explained the proper methods of gaining quick starts on breakways, making quick stops, reversing directions, skating backwards and turning either way. In stick handling, Mr. Squabriggs stated, that is always well to have a firm grip on the stick and in order to lay out of effective passes to your team-mates it is best to keep the stick in front of you at all times. Mr. Voss added many worth-while suggestions as to receiving and giving out passes, points concerning the art of shooting, and how the defensive and offensive tactics of teams have completely reversed themselves in recent years.

The second session of the afternoon was led by Ivan Nicholson of Alberta. It concerned play from the point of the goalkeeper, the defenceman and the forward and how they should make their defensive and offensive plays when in certain situations. Mr. Voss also gave his advice on some of the situations which he has both experienced and witnessed during his many years of big league duty both as a player and a referee.

The evening session started at 7:30 with Mr. Voss explaining the most generally accepted interpretations of the rules of hockey and how and why a referee should enforce them. This was divided into two sections with Mr. Nicholson giving an interesting talk on the "Psychology of Hockey" between the two.

The school will continue its instructions today at the same place with all three gentlemen being on hand to lead the discussion. The school will end this evening with a general discussion following the annual banquet and the showing of the 1954 Stanley Cup Finals between Montreal Canadiens and the Detroit Red Wings.
