Mrs. L. B. Leard and Miss Annie Leard, who have spent the winter months in Alberton, returned on Thursday to their home in Brooklyn.

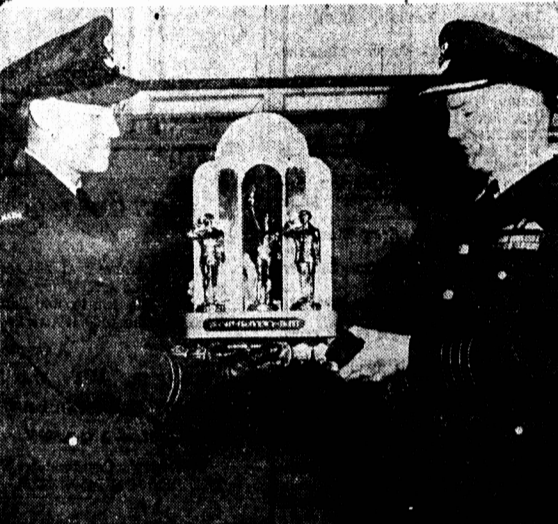

Let's Talk It Over

Many universities, and some high schools throughout the country, impose restrictions on participation in athletics, making it dependent on academic achievement. A student must make satisfactory progress in his studies before he can take part in athletic sports under the supervision of the university or high school.

In some of the larger universities, of course, prowess in athletics has become an important means of advertising the seat of learning, and it is becoming increasingly difficult to enforce existing regulations as they apply to a star athlete in any particular sport. Many now believe that in at least some of these centres, a student's ability to shoot baskets from all angles on a basketball floor, or throw a long, accurate forward pass on a football field, can cover a lot of vagueness in matters of philosophy, physics and mathematics.

As far as high schools are concerned, the practice of imposing these restrictions can easily be over-emphasized. It seems desirable that young people with an aptitude, whether it be music, mathematics, or making the red light twinkle behind a goal net, should be permitted to express themselves to give their God-given talent full rein. It takes all kinds of people to make a world, and if a youngster can make a better mouse-trap than his neighbour, by all means, let us get him the lumber and the wire, and tell him to go right ahead.

We think the practice of some restriction, carefully applied, can be of use, however. The lure of school sports sometimes puts pupils, with sufficient ability to succeed in their studies, on the road to academic failure. If they knew from the start that they could not drop below a certain minimum of effort in school studies, if they expected to take part in school sports, a more evenly balanced outlook might result. Please note, we say "minimum effort", not "minimum of achievement." Dull pupils should not be punished for failing to accomplish the impossible.

Is it not possible that some kind of restriction based on a pupil's effort in study, insofar as that can be measured, with the pupil given the benefit of the least shadow of doubt, might produce beneficial results? Personally, we think it would.
