The meeting also approved a gift of \$50 to a school of alcohol studies in connection with the annual meeting of the Canadian Temperance Federation in Montreal on December 2-3, and Rev. Howard Christie, Hunter River, Rev. R. A. MacLeod, St. Peter's, and Mr. Robert Caruthers of Kensington were appointed delegates to this meeting.

TORONTO, (CP)—Edgella Beacon Jester Standard, owned by Edison Mutch of North River, P.E.I., Monday won the grand championship for Jersey bulls at the Royal Agricultural Winter

Fair, Edgella World Beacon, belonging to Bagg and Son of Edgely, Ont., was reserve winner. Mr. Mutch's bull was the senior champion and Edgella Beacon Standard Penn from Cecil Mortson's Queensville, Ont., farm was junior champion.

The grand champion was bred by the Baggys of Edgely, Ont. Two outstanding dual-purpose Shorthorn bulls have recently been brought into this Province from Central Canada by the Federal Department of Agriculture, Livestock Branch.

The older of these bulls, Sanford Sally's Lad, born September 11, 1950, was Reserve Grand Champion at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto in 1952. His dam, Sanford Sally 4th, 2, 3, 4 and 5-year-old records of 9,790, 9,883, 8,657, and 9,212 lbs. of milk, with 363, 408, 319 and 349 lbs of butter fat respectively.

The younger bull, Watermead Stetson Gladish, born September 1952, is a son of Sanford Sally's Lad. His dam, Bonnie Rosemary 44th produced 6,292 lbs of milk with 4.6 butter fat test in 9 months as a 2-year-old. Her record was not completed when this information was obtained. His grand-dam, Bonnie Rosemary 30th, had a 4-year-old record of 12,488 lbs. of 4.39 milk and mature record of 11,138 lbs of 5.4 milk.

The village of Spring Park voted 81 to 68 in favor of village incorporation at a plebiscite held in that area yesterday which added another progressive community to the growing list of places seeking and accepting Village Incorporation.

Tignish heads the list in size with a population of 808 people, men, women and children. Projects already implemented or in process include a new fire engine, repairs to the present engine, a new extension ladder and several new ladders, construction of new water tanks and the development of natural water supplies for fire protection, replacement of hose and equipment, street lighting, sidewalks and traffic signs.

Although some of the scenes last evening were obviously intended at one time to be very serious, the cast inserted subtle touches of humour making them more laugh-provoking than ever. Taps among these was the climax with the villain tying the heroes to the railroad tracks, only to find that his own foot was caught as the train came closer and closer.

The Intermediate Saint Dunstan's University football team and Prince of Wales College apparently trying to find out what happens when an irresistible force meets an immovable object, played a 3-3 draw yesterday afternoon and left their football series still unfinished.

The game was the fifth in a best of three series and it marked the third time that the teams paraded off the playing field with a tie score. In addition to three draws each team has one victory.

The Charlottetown Islanders, strengthened by the additions of Wild Bill LeBlanc, Gerry LaChance and Guy Gignac, showed a complete reversal of form last night to whip the league-leading Sydney Millionaires 6-2 at the Forum before a crowd of 1240 spectators.

The Islanders, at full strength for practically the first time this year, gave their most impressive display as they outscored the Millionaires in every period. The win boosted the cellar dwelling Islanders to within two points of third place Glace Bay Miners.

WEDNESDAY

Only a few days of finishing work remains to be done on the interior of the new indoor rink at Crapaud, and this will be completed before there is sufficient frost to make natural ice. A gleaming aluminum covered structure, the new rink is located beside the Trans Canada Highway on the western approach to the village.

Under the capable supervision of the contractor, Mr. Wilfred Maynard, of Summerside, the new rink was constructed mostly by local labor, and the lumber used in construction was obtained and milled locally.

A public hearing on the called telephone strike has been set for December 10 by the Public Utilities Commission. It was stated last night by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman of the Commission.

The recently appointed two ad hoc commissioners, Messrs. J. Lincoln Dewar, New Perth, and James S. Walker, Charlottetown, were sworn into office by Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan of the Supreme Court, and the full Commission then held an immediate meeting to decide on a date for the public hearing.

The regular Commission is comprised of Judge Trainor, Mr. L. B. McMillan and Mr. W. R. Brennan, secretary. Under the regulatory powers conferred on the Commission by Acts of the Legislature it is necessary for the Legislative Council to name two extra commissioners for the specific purpose of public hearings in matters of dispute. The appointment of the ad hoc commissioners ceases with reaching of a settlement.

Islanders are still doing well at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto and the latest to come up with a topnotch showing was Keith Boswell and Sons, of Victoria, with their Ayrshire herd of 11 entries. With this entry they captured 10 ribbons including a first prize with their junior yearling bull, "Finesse," Treasurer.

Their veteran cow, Lealand's Royal Victoria, won second place in the class for cows 10 years and over, defeating two excellent cows from the Province of Ontario.

Word of the placings was received from Mr. Boswell last night.

Dr. S. R. Laycock, who is at present on a lecture tour of the Maritime Provinces, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday and will address a public meeting in P.W.C. tonight.

Last evening Dr. Laycock was the guest of the Provincial Home and School executive at the home of Dr. and Mrs. J. P. Lantz, when representatives of various educational groups were invited to meet and talk with him informally.

Dr. Laycock has recently returned from Europe, where he had an unusual opportunity to study educational conditions at first hand, and gave a most interesting account of visits to schools and institutions in England and the Scandinavian countries and his impressions of what was being accomplished there. Of special interest was his description of the work being done in rehabilitation and in the field of abnormal psychology.

A new Credit Union organization of Federal Government employees came into existence last evening at a large and enthusiastic meeting of prospective members held in the board room of the P. E. Island Credit Union League Ltd. This brings to five the number of such organizations now in full operation in Charlottetown.

On invitation from Mr. George Cheverie, who acted as chairman, Mr. L. J. Corcoran, representing the P. E. Island Credit Union League, addressed the assembly, describing in detail the necessary procedure to have the proposed organization become a going concern.

For the past eight weeks all members of the unit have been planning and working toward the smoothly conducted shift of unit personnel, students, aircraft, and equipment from Greenwood to Summerside all of which took place with no appreciable break in the continuity of training.

Summerside's grand old lady, Mrs. Sarah Tamlyn, today celebrates her 100th birthday. She was born in Hope River on November 18th, 1853 and came to Summerside as a child. For some years now she has resided with her daughter, Mrs. D. F. MacNeil, Cedar Street. Her only son, James, who left Summerside some years ago to reside in Western Canada, predeceased her three years ago at North Battleford, Sask.

TORONTO, (CP)—Edison Mutch of North River, P.E.I., won the Inniscaira trophy for his grand champion bull win in Jersey judging at the Royal Winter Fair here Wednesday.

William Russell of South Edmonton, Alta., won the percheron stallion grand championship. Rex Mondraghope, junior grand champion, was a surprise for grand championship honors, beating out Arnoldwold Jasome, Gilbert Arnold, Grenville, Que., the senior champion, who took grand reserve ribbons.

A meeting of P.E.I. potato dealers was held at Robson's Restaurant in Summerside last evening.

A lengthy report by the dealers representative, Col. G. E. Full on orders emanating from the Marketing Board was given, and a question and answer period followed. One of the principal subjects discussed was a matter that has come to the attention of the Potato Dealers Association concerning price cutting of P.E.I. potatoes on Montreal and Toronto markets by one or more P.E.I. dealers over the last week or so.

Mr. A. L. Hepworth, assistant educational director, Canadian Congress of Labour with headquarters at Ottawa, addressed a meeting of local union representatives held in the recreation hall of the C.N.R. last evening.

The meeting was in the nature of a round table exploratory session in which Island union bodies holding allegiance to either the C.C.L. or the T.C.L. discussed the possibility of setting up week-end joint union institute courses to study matters of common interest. Such subjects as labour's role in the community, adult education, shop steward training, collective bargaining and grievance procedure were accepted as desirable studies.

"There seems to be a tremendously increased interest in things of the spirit" said Mrs. Rev. Charles B. Templeton in addressing a large gathering who came to hear him and all of the evangelistic work being carried on by her husband and herself.

The main auditorium of Trinity United Church was filled, as Mrs. Templeton not only inspired her listeners with her beautiful ren-

dition of several sacred numbers, but told of the enthusiasm shown by those who attended their meetings. She cited two instances, one in Youngstown, Ohio and the other in Evansville, Indiana, where her husband introduced a noon service at one of the downtown theatres. People came in the thousands, in the middle of the day, to hear the gospel preached. Professional men, businessmen and men in overall suits by side throughout their lunch hour to listen to the gospel in story and song.

FRIDAY

The potato movement from Prince Edward Island since the Co-operative Pool Selling Agency commenced operations on October 13 has reached record proportions. More than 1,500,000 bushels have been purchased from producers through the agency, reports Mr. D. A. Macdonald, chairman of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board.

The movement to Central Canada has been fairly heavy, and in addition boat loads are being assembled and shipped continually to Southeastern United States, to Caribbean area ports and to South America. It is fortunate that the weather has remained mild, as most of the stock already moved was not protected from frost.

Five appeals from convictions by Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. Macdonald, Q.C., were dismissed in Supreme Court yesterday by Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan. They were appeals from conviction obtained by the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board for violations of its orders.

New evidence was introduced in only two of the five appeals. Judge MacGuigan stated early in the proceedings that in the case of Douglas Aitken he had to be guided by the decision in the Willie case and felt that the case for the respondent had been proved. He expressed the opinion that the appellant had not been charged with selling potatoes without a license, but just selling potatoes which he had produced without obtaining a license.

Mr. H. F. McPhee, Q.C., appearing for the Board said that a farmer is a producer throughout the season and does not cease to be a producer simply because his crop is dug. He said farming is an occupation and cited an analogy regarding any professional man taking an annual holiday. Mr. McPhee said he did not cease to be a lawyer or a doctor just because he was not in his office.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19—(Special)—Research work at various points in Prince Edward Island and in inland waters is described in the annual report of the Fisheries Research Board, tabled in the Commons today by J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Sinclair.

Mr. MacNaught said the 200-page report was an excellent one and gave a comprehensive idea of fishery research projects now being carried out on both coasts. Chairman of the Fisheries Research Board is Dr. G. B. Reed.

Keen enthusiasm made up for lack of experience when Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild opened their season last night. A psychological drama, a Biblical piece, and a comedy, played to a near-capacity audience at the Empire Theatre.

The best play in the opinion of the adjudicator, Mrs. Barbara Roper, assisted by a committee, was "To What Purpose", directed by Cecelia Blatch. Eleanor Hughes, who played Hester Warren in "Still Stands The House" was the best actress and Dick Turpin as Jim Cripps in "A Point of View", was the best actor.

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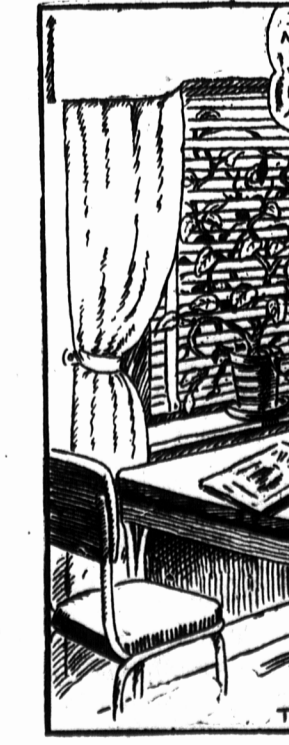
