

# S'side Citizens Are Asked To Conserve Water Supply

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
A broken water pump at the Harvard Street well, Summerside's largest single source of water, occurred last evening, leaving the town without its greatest water producing pump for the second time within the week.  
An appeal to Summerside residents for conservation in their use of town water was made again last evening by Councillor Robert Dewar, chairman of the water committee, who pointed out the need for co-operation until replacement parts arrive here by air from California, and until the

pump is back in production. Councillor Dewar urged special particularity during this period in the prevention of fires, when the town's pumping capacity has been cut by 435-gallons per minute.  
**FIRST BREAK**  
The first break occurred in the pump early this week, and new bearings were brought in from Nova Scotia, and the pump returned to service early Wednesday evening.  
New trouble at the pump was again detected about 6 p.m. last evening, and investigation revealed that major damage had resulted to the pump gears.

A call to the pump manufacturers in Berkeley, California, was made by Councillor Dewar, and because of the four hour time difference between the two points, was able to talk to company representatives and arrange for shipment of necessary parts by air last evening.  
It was hoped that the shipment would arrive in Summerside this weekend, but in the event that the pump is not restored to service by the first of the week, it is hoped that housewives will cooperate in the emergency and delay the washing of the family clothes until the pump is restored to service later in the week.

# HOUSING CONSTRUCTION PROGRESSES

Despite bitter, cold weather work is progressing favorably on the Hillcrest housing development on Upper Granville Street. 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# Business Lag Reason Given For Increase In Ferry Rate

**SUMMERSIDE**—Prince Edward Islanders have been told by Canadian National Railways that it was more or less a matter of a failure to take advantage of the lower rates and a lack of business by the railways that caused the recent hike in ferry rates.  
In a full reply to a letter from the Summerside Board of Trade to the transport commissioners

the CNR has said that it was only fulfilling a general increase granted it by the transport commissioners in 1957.  
This increase was to go into effect throughout Canada but, "we refrained from applying it within the Maritime Provinces in the hope and expectation that by so doing our rail patronage in this area would increase," the CNR explains.  
However, when such hopes and expectations were not realized steps were then taken by the railway to have the rates put into effect in May of 1958. The increase was not made effective at Borden-Tormentine until October because a great number of travel folders had been printed with the old rates inscribed in them and these would have been rendered useless.  
"You will see that these fare increases were quite in order and within the authority granted by the board no doubt people in Prince Edward Island feel they are being subjected to an additional increase to that in effect elsewhere. This, of course, is not the case," the CNR said.  
At the time the rate increases went into effect between the two ferry terminals the Summerside board wrote the commissioners of transport asking the reason and expressing concern that auto and truck rates might be raised.  
"The CNR at the time replied that no such increases were planned and reiterated the statement in the latest note to the board.

# Airman's Idea Wins Him \$1,000

**OTTAWA**—A suggestion made by Squadron Leader Robert S. Burks, 35, of Vancouver, B.C., has won for him \$1,000, it was announced today by air force headquarters.  
The \$1,000 check, largest ever awarded to a member of the RCAF for an original suggestion, was won by S.L. Burks for his improved aircraft compass calibration procedure which will result in increased navigation accuracy and reduce the number of compass calibrations required each year.  
In 1946, S-L Burks left the service after completing his third year at the University of British Columbia, rejoined the RCAF. In the post-war years he served on search and rescue duties on the west coast and instructed at the Central Navigation School at Summerside.
