Argos, Attawa Not Sponsoring Football Teams

Many times in the last few years football fans in Canada have openly wondered how the professionals stay in business. They have pulled some strange stunts, particularly helter-skelter methods of spending untold thousands of dollars in a panicky search for Americans.

The money tossed away by the annual airlift of Americans in last-minute desperate bids to field a winning team could have been channelled into development of Canadian talent. But the pro clubs, with few exceptions, didn't see it that way.

Last year, the eastern Big Four was complimented on all sides when it formed the Big Four intermediate league. Each pro team sponsored an intermediate club and at the end of the season convener Harold Platt said it turned out to be a "satisfactory organization."

DOWN TO TWO TEAMS. This year, there are two teams left—Lake Shore Alouettes, sponsored by Montreal Alouettes, and Brantford Tiger-Cats, farm club of Hamilton which, incidentally, has one of the strongest Canadian benches in the country.

Toronto Argonauts and Ottawa Rough Riders have pulled out. Why?

General Manager Lew Hayman of Argonauts had his answer ready this week. "We are simply changing our format. We feel we should go into the plan of development of Canadian players much more seriously than we have in the past," he said. "We'll help morally and financially and we'll pay out more money this year in our Canadian development plan than we ever did before. Additionally, the boys indicated to us that they preferred to play closer to home."

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Jockey Is On Critical List After 3rd Big Spill Of Career

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Jockey Ralph Neves, riding on borrowed time the last 21 years, inched slowly ahead Sunday in his third match race with death.

The 41-year-old rider was still on the critical list following brain surgery Saturday night. Neves suffered a skull fracture and two broken vertebrae when his mount, Rhin, fell in the third race Saturday at Hollywood Park.

Rhin got up and galloped away but Neves had to be carried from the track. He regained consciousness, then drowned off and doctors discovered a break in his skull. A blood clot on his brain was removed during a 2 1/2-hour operation.

PRONOUNCED DEAD Neves has won out over death twice before. Near the start of his racing career, on May 8, 1938, at Bay Meadows, he was aboard Fannikins when the horse crossed his legs in the middle of the pack. Neves went down at the half mile pole and was pronounced dead by the track physician.

As a matter of routine, the physician injected adrenalin in the rider's heart and a few minutes later Neves was back on his feet.

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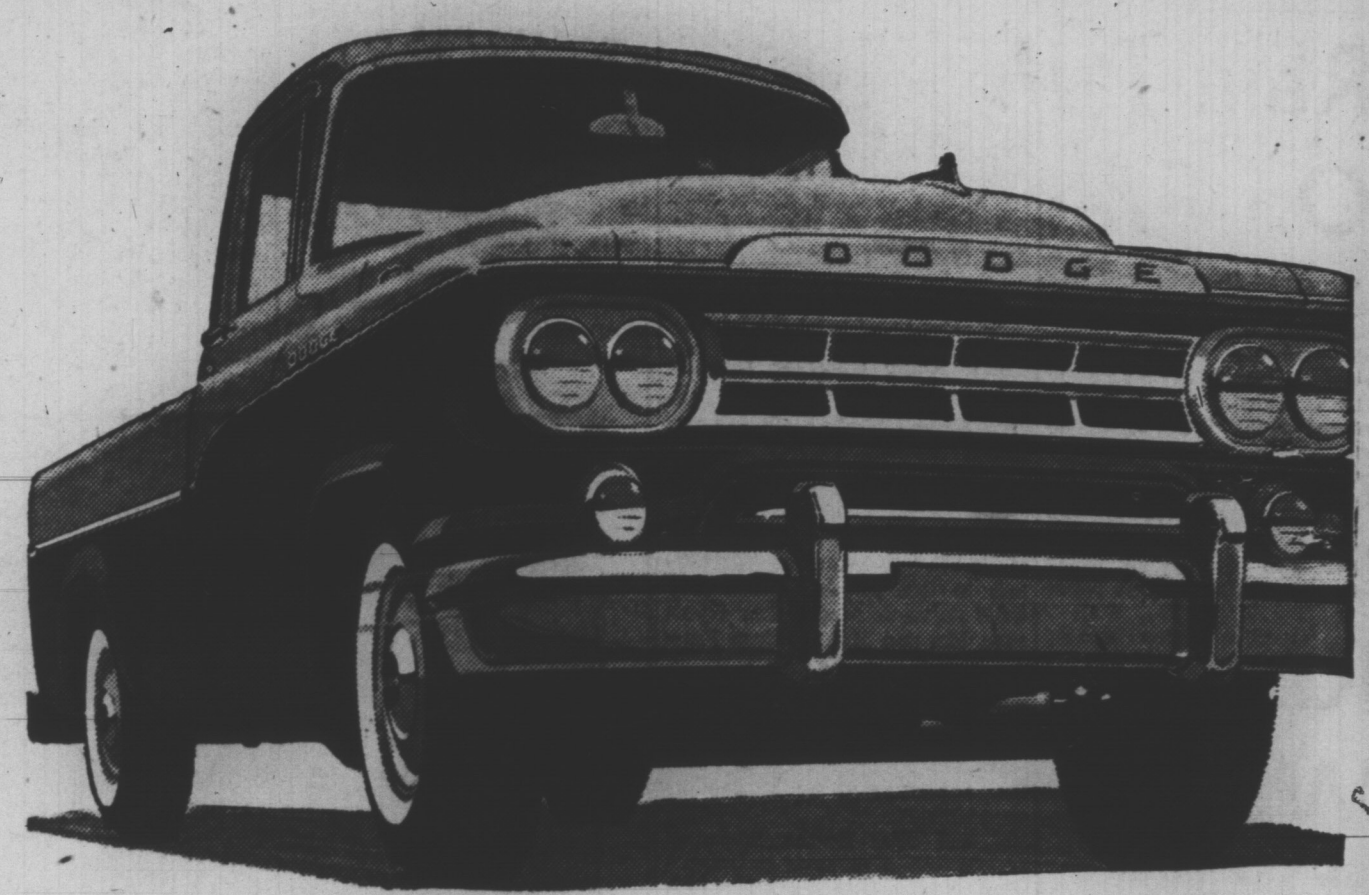
Mt. Stewart Tops St. Peters

This was the second win for the Legionaires, having won by default last Sunday when Souris failed to field a team.



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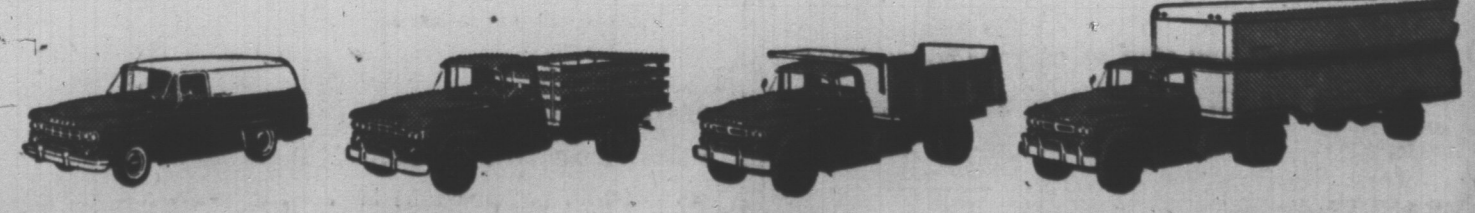
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
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
