Major Step Forward Seen In Treatment Of Bleeders

By WILLIAM C. HARRISON MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (AP)—Three brothers who are bleeders have helped test a new substance which their pediatrician calls "a major step forward in the treatment of hemophilia."

The boys are Stanley, 20; Stewart, 18, and Ian, 4, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley R. Forbes. Forbes is a Southern Pacific Railroad freight agent. Four other Forbes sons are free of the hereditary disease.

The treatment, now available for general use, depends on an off-white powdery substance called AHP (antihemophilic factor) concentrate. The substance supplies a missing blood-clotting factor without which a hemophiliac can bleed to death from a scratch.

Heretofore, frequent and lengthy hospital confinement could be expected by hemophiliacs with less than one per cent of the normal amount of the clotting factor in their blood. Minor accidents of day-to-day living would send them to hospital perhaps 20 times a year for six-hour transfusions of blood or plasma to curb bleeding.

Now a quick injection of AHP concentrate administered at home usually can stop the bleeding in minutes or hours where days and weeks used to be required.

DRUG APPROVED

The substance, which received U.S. Food and Drug Administration approval in July, is produced by Hyland Laboratories of Los Angeles.

The material is a glycine precipitate of the protein in plasma from adults with a high concentration of antihemophilic factor in their blood. Thirty cubic centimetres of distilled water is combined with 222 units of AHP concentrate for injection. A unit of AHP is a quantity of globulin that will increase the anti-hemophilic activity of 100 millilitres of plasma one per cent.

"The other stuff (blood and plasma) would take a long time, and I'd get all sorts of reactions—hives and chills, that sort

of thing," Stewart said in an interview.

"With this new stuff, I don't seem to get any reaction at all, and it only takes a few minutes."

Concern Is Felt For Two In Boat

LONDON (AP)—Serious concern is being felt here for the safety of two young Britons who set out from the United States in an effort to row across the Atlantic.

David Johnstone, 35, and John Hoare, 28, haven't been seen since Aug. 12 when a U.S. Coast Guard cutter spotted them in mid-Atlantic.

British and American authorities are reported considering plans for a full-scale search, although the men's relatives have not yet asked for one. The Britons left Norfolk, Va., May 21, two weeks ahead of another British pair—paratroopers John Ridgeway and Shay Blyth—who successfully rowed the 3,000 miles in 92 days.

Ridgeway and Blyth reached Ireland Sept. 3 in their 29-foot Scottish fisherman's dory.

Sweden's Ruling Party Staggered By Vote Blow

By SAM HALL STOCKHOLM (Reuters) Sweden's ruling Social Democrats staggered under the worst blow at the polls for more than 30 years Monday, as voters made clear they were fed up with high prices, high taxation, inflation, and a severe housing shortage.

In the last year has soared 12 per cent.

SHORT OF HOUSES Political experts here claimed that many of the 400,000 new voters turned their backs on the government because Erlander remarked before the election that young people in Stockholm without a home should move out of the capital.

Married couples face a wait of an average 10 to 12 years for an apartment in Stockholm, while families with two children may have to wait five years.

In Stockholm, 170,000 people are waiting for homes, out of a total population of about a million.

Young voters were believed to have shunned the government also because they consider its foreign policy, especially on Viet Nam, too non-committal.

Shortages of teachers, doctors, nurses, and day schools also have taken their toll of Social Democratic votes.

The Communists increased their share of the vote to 6.6 from 3.4 per cent.

Whatever the various factors in the election, however, there appears to have been a widespread desire for a change from 34 years of Social Democratic rule. For the first time, the centre and Liberal parties worked together—and many people sized the alternative with open arms.

Old Skeletons Found In Que.

OTTAWA (CP)—Government archeologists have uncovered two skeletons, estimated to be 3,000 years old, at Coteau du Lac, Que., about 30 miles southwest of Montreal.

The historic sites division of the department of northern affairs and natural resources, which has been doing excavating work at the site of an old fort near the rapids of Coteau,

said here the skeletons almost certainly are those of Indians.

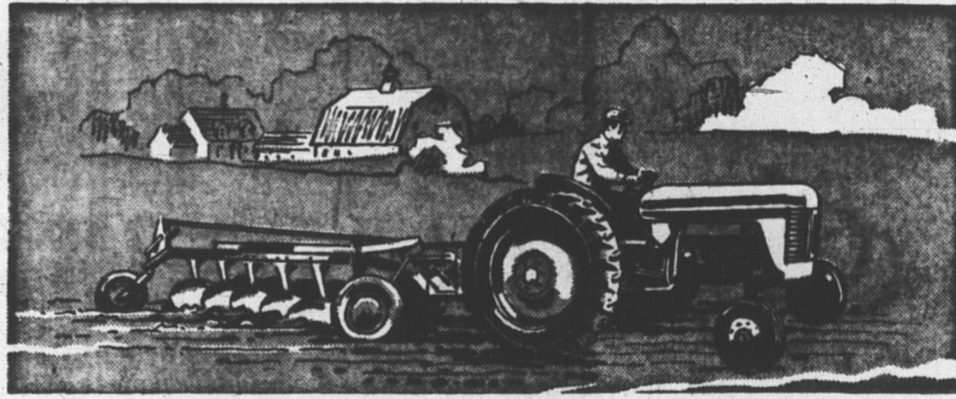
One skeleton, found in flexed position, is intact. The other one is incomplete. Archeologists think it was disturbed during the construction of the ramparts of the fort under which it was found.

The first post at the site was built shortly before 1780 for the protection of small boats passing the rapids.

In the war of 1812 it became an important strategic position and a wooden octagonal blockhouse was built.

Also built were barracks, warehouses, a commandant's house and other blockhouses. The fort was abandoned in 1851.

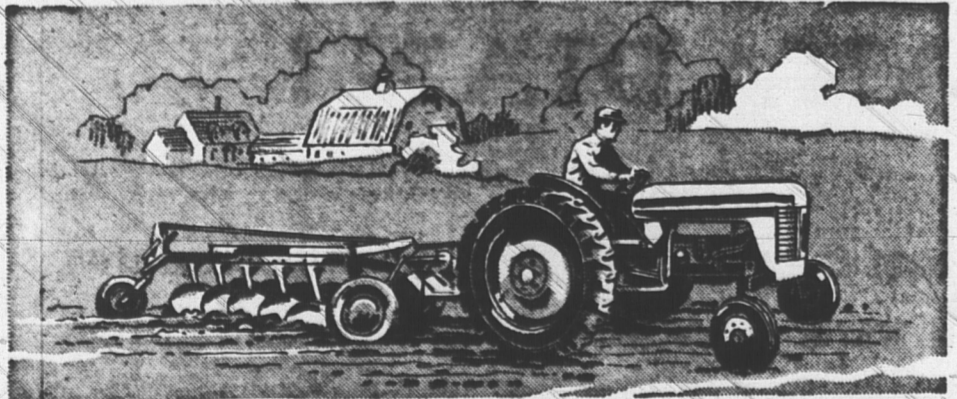
