EASTER NUMBER OF THE CANADIAN.

Magnificent illustrations make the Easter Number of The Canadian Magazine very attractive. The cover is appropriate, and the colored illustrations for Theodore Robert's poem are something new for a Canadian periodical. The stories are contributed by Joanna E. Wood, W. A. Fraser, Bessie Cameron, Clinton Ross, H. J. O'Higgins and Margaret O'Grady. Sir Louis H. Davies writes feelingly of the late Lord Herschell in an article which shows the national character of this magazine. Judge Ermatinger gives many interesting facts about Major Rogers, commander of the famous Rogers' Rangers of Revolutionary Times. There is also a full page portrait of this man who was afterwards governor of Michilimackinac and was tried by court-martial in Montreal in 1768. Major General S. range writes of the Niagara Canal, and William Taorop on the possibilities of closer union between the West Indies and Canada. There is a two-page article on Thomas Hays, the famous railroad magnate; a short article on Easter and many other attractive features.

NEWS NOTES.

Prince Louis Napoleon is, according to private information from the Russian capital, more conspicuous than ever at the Court of St. Petersburg. A few days ago he dined with the Czar, after which he was closeted with His Majesty for several hours. He will shortly leave St. Petersburg for Brussels, on another visit to his brother, Prince Victor. The betrothal of Prince Louis with the daughter of the Grand Duke Paul is once more the subject of conversation in court circles at the Russian capital.

Two presentations at Her Majesty's recent drawing room which Canadians will be interested in are Lady Isobel Gathorne Hardy, nee Lady Isobel Stanley, only daughter, of Lord and Lady Derby, who was presented for the first time on her marriage; and Lady Dillon, nee Miss Stanton, of Ottawa. Lady Isobel wore her wedding gown of richest ivory duchesse satin trimmed with antique Brudee soie under a manteau du Cour of the same rich satin, lined with soft mousseline and bordered with ruffles. She also wore the bridal veil and plumes, her ornaments being diamonds and pearls. Lady Dillon's gown was of pearl gray satin arranged with chiffon and incrustations of white silk; the train of grey satin was brocaded with large black flowers and lined with mauve and trimmed with black chiffon, a most becoming frock to the wearer.

LONDON, March 30.—The British Museum has received a bequest of £50,000 by the will of the late Vincent Stucky McLennan, a lawyer. Mr. McLennan also left \$50,000 to the Bristol corporation for library purposes, £5,000 to the Bristol College, and £20,000 to the Bristol Orphanage.

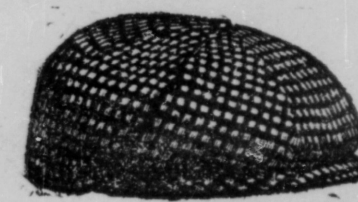

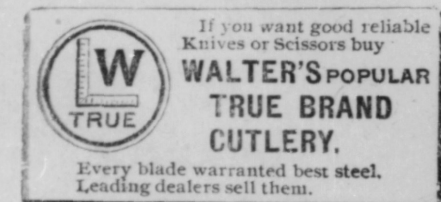
