Canada Hails British Sea Move

Ottawa (CP) - Fisheries Minister Robichaud said here he welcomes Britain's move to extend her fishing limit to 12 miles from three.

The extension, announced Tuesday, goes into effect Sept. 30.

Mr. Robichaud said the move "strengthens the position of Canada's fishery which declared its own 12-mile fishing limit earlier this summer. Canada now is negotiating recognition of the new limit by nations that fish along Canadian coasts.

He said the principle of the 12-mile limit is gaining wider and wider acceptance and it may not be long before all the major countries adopt it.

Mr. Robichaud said the move "strengthens the position of Canada's fishery which declared its own 12-mile fishing limit earlier this summer. Canada now is negotiating recognition of the new limit by nations that fish along Canadian coasts.

He said the principle of the 12-mile limit is gaining wider and wider acceptance and it may not be long before all the major countries adopt it.
