Dr. Smith said there was no doubt the case was a genuine one, but agreed with the local physicians that it had not yet progressed to such a stage as to become dangerous. It is understood that he will communicate with the Ottawa authorities advising them that it is perfectly safe to allow the young man to return to his home in Barbados.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A somewhat serious accident happened to Mr. David Reid, of Reid's corner, yesterday afternoon. According to the Guardian's Summerside correspondent Mr. Reid was driving homeward from Summerside and when near the residence of Mr. John M. Clarke, at the east end of the town, a runaway team without a driver came rushing upon him and before he was aware of its danger the horses were upon his truck wagon. In the collision Mr. Reid was thrown out on the frozen ground, the horses and wagon passing over him. He was considerably bruised and shaken up but no bones were broken. He was taken to Dr. McPhail's office and his wounds dressed. At latest accounts he was progressing favorably.

THE BRAM CASE.—The Boston correspondent of the St. John Sun writes: It is thought that Thomas M. Bram, formerly mate of the barkentine Herbert Fuller, will not be convicted of murder at the trial of the famous case. The decision of the United States Supreme Court ordering a new trial was not unexpected, although no one looked for the case to hinge on the exception taken relative to the interviewing of Bram by Detective Power at Halifax. It is rumored here that at the next trial new and startling testimony implicating a person other than Bram or the seaman Brown in the murder of Capt. Nash, Mrs. Nash and second mate Bamberg will be introduced. Bram's lawyers, Messrs. Cotter and French, will make another strong fight, and will have considerable new evidence.
