

## Loss Of Salted Cod Market Is Described As Temporary

OTTAWA (CP)—The loss of the Jamaican market for Newfoundland salted codfish is only temporary, Trade Minister Churchill said Friday in the Commons.

"We will be back into it and we will establish very firmly our trade with The West Indies," he said during study of trade department estimates.

Mr. Churchill said Canadian products will not be undersold by subsidized fish production in other countries. But he did not elaborate on what would be done to prevent it.

He said the government will study suggestions made by Chesley W. Carter (L—Burlingame) for preferential freight rates.

As for expanding Newfoundland's fish exports to The West Indies and Europe, Mr. Churchill said it appears the first necessary steps to be taken are to raise the quality of the product.

"We are not necessarily producing the types of graded fish that some of our customers would like to have."

J. W. Pickersgill (L—Bonaville-Twilligate) proposed federal premiums to encourage production of high-quality salt fish for the Spanish and Italian markets. He said he had urged unsuccessfully such a system on the Liberal cabinet when he was immigration minister.

first things that must be done before Canada can ship more to The West Indies is a customs union among the islands forming part of The West Indies Federation. Canada wanted to expand its sales of industrial goods to the federation in return for tropical produce.

"I think it can be expanded," he said.

Canada had offered the federation the gift of a ship for inter-island trade. There was no indication that trade with Canada had been seriously curtailed because the eight-ship fleet of the Canadian National Steamships' West Indies service was strikebound for a year and now is up for sale.

Lionel Chevrier (L—Montreal Laurier), former transport minister said a serious attempt should have been made to keep the fleet in service. He said he doubts the minister's statement the fleet's withdrawal does not mean a reduction of trade.

Mr. Churchill said he was prepared to have another look at the situation.

**REFERS TO MEETINGS**

The minister referred to a recent series of meetings between himself, Fisheries Minister MacLean and Revenue Minister Nowlan with representatives of the Newfoundland and Nova Scotia salt fish industry.

He recognized the industry's need for assistance through advice and organizational help. Government experts had been told to continue negotiations and work up a program as soon as possible.
