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Pearson Charges Denied

By DAVE McINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—The minority Progressive Conservative government won its first crucial vote in the Commons Tuesday night when a Social Credit motion of non-confidence was defeated 233 to 30.

Only the Social Credit group supported the motion, which would have overthrown the government if it had carried. It was wrecked in such a way, however, that neither the Liberals nor New Democrats could have backed it.

In a rare display of interest, every MP was in his seat for the voting. The 115 Conservatives got support from 100 Liberals and 18 NDP members in opposing the motion.

Earlier Tuesday in the throne speech debate, Prime Minister Diefenbaker made an appeal for defeat of a Liberal non-confidence motion due to be voted on Thursday night.

Robert Thompson, Social Credit leader, indicated such support will be supplied by his party. He spoke while moving his party's version of non-confidence, which was greeted by laughter from Conservatives, Liberals and the NDP.

The motion said the government doesn't deserve the confidence of Parliament because it hasn't pursued policies based on its principles.

WON'T BACK LIBERALS After its derisive reception, Mr. Thompson said his group is determined to follow the role of statesmanship rather than bring on a constitutional crisis.

SERGEANT FEELS IT'S DISGRACE

OXFORD, Miss. (AP)—Standing in the damp quiet night the military police sergeant spoke.

"It is a national disgrace," the sergeant, with 18 years service, is a member of a battalion flown into this university town to maintain order.

The night was a sharp reversal from the previous night when an estimated 1,000 rioters attacked federal marshals trying to maintain order on the University of Mississippi campus.

The sergeant continued: "We are specially trained to fight and kill to keep our country free anywhere in the world. We have to waste this precious time and effort and equipment to come down here, to lay down and point loaded rifles toward our fellow men."

FEW CAUSE TROUBLE Another sergeant said: "We figure it's only about 12 per cent of the students causing any trouble here."

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MISSISSIPPI GOVERNOR GETS 10-DAY REPRIEVE

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Mississippi Governor Ross Barnett received a 10-day reprieve from federal punishment for his vain opposition to Negro James H. Meredith's enrollment at the University of Mississippi. The justice department suggested the delay.

Instead of sending Barnett to prison or fining him on the spot, a federal appeals court gave him a form of probation until Oct. 12—apparently a test of his willingness to accept fully Meredith's integration into previously all-white student ranks.

The courtroom drama ended without a showdown, Meredith quietly completed a second day's round of classes at the university campus in northern Mississippi.

Twice last week, Barnett personally blocked Meredith's admission to the university. But in the face of federal troop intervention, the governor made no intrusion Monday when Meredith finally was registered.

SEARCH MADE FOR KILLERS

OXFORD, Miss. (AP)—A justice department spokesman says an intensive investigation is under way to find the slayers of two men shot to death during rioting on the University of Mississippi campus last Sunday night.

"We will probably get the fellows who pulled the trigger," Edward Guthman, press secretary to Attorney-General Robert F. Kennedy, said Tuesday.

Guthman said officers as yet do not know whether the slaying of French reporter Paul Gihard, 30, and Walter Ray Edgar, 27, was a premeditated crime, were accidental or deliberate.

Guthman said the deputy marshals on the campus did not fire six pistol shots during the rioting.
