The bark Lucy Pope, McDonald, Master, from Bristol, and the brigantine Edith, McRae, from Swansea, arrived at Bay Verte yesterday. It is reported that a person named Laird has patriotically opened a store at Rustico for the supply of United States fishermen with what they want.

At the opening of the Upper Prince Street School yesterday the number of pupils present was 482, and to-day—the 31st—the number present was 507. Rev. J. Hutchison, M. A., will (D. V.) officiate at Lot 48, on Sabbath first, the 6th of September, at 11 o'clock, a. m.; and at Birch Hill at 2.30 p. m. His Grace Archbishop Lynch, of Toronto, who has been the guest of Owen Connolly, Esq., during the past three weeks, left the Island for home this morning.

It is stated that United States fishermen are taking and buying fish and obtaining supplies at Rustico, with supreme indifference to cruisers or custom-house officers. Large Mackerel.—Mr. Wm. Yorston, of Georgetown, caught a mackerel, a few days ago, which measured twenty-one inches, and weighed two pounds and fifteen ounces when dressed. Correction.—The City Schools were reopened yesterday with a total attendance of 1,040 pupils, viz.: Prince Street School, 482; Queen Square School, 225; West Kent Street School, 333.

Two young men for injuring a boat were fined \$20 each. A sailor accused of stealing a suit of clothes was held over till to-morrow.

His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, accompanied by his Secretary, the Rev. Father Burke, and the Revs. D. J. Gillis, East Point, James E. McDonald, DeSable, Gregory McDonald, Bear River, and Allan McDonald, Fort Augustus, were passengers by the Western express train this morning. His Lordship is en route for the Pacific Coast via the C. P. R., and before returning will visit San Francisco and other western cities of the United States. Father Burke, accompanies His Lordship as far as Montreal, and is expected back at his post in about ten days. We wish His Lordship and the Reverend Clergy bon voyage and a safe return home.

The market to-day was well attended, sales were brisk at the following prices: Beef (small) 7 to 10 cents per lb; do per qtr 4 to 7 cts; mutton, 5 to 8 cts; pork (small) 6 to 8 cts; lamb, 35 to 60 cts per qtr; ham per lb, 13 to 14c; fowls, 40 to 45 cts. pair; butter (fresh) 20 to 22; do (tub) 16 to 18 cts; eggs, 10 to 11c; tomato plants, 10c per doz; beans, 4 cts per quart; peas, 10 cts per quart; flour per 100 pounds, \$2.25 to \$2.75; oatmeal, do, \$2.30 to \$2.50; oats, 34 cts; hay per 100, 50 to 55 cts; new potatoes, 30 cents; veal, 3 to 7 cts per lb; radish per bunch, 6 cents; lobsters, 4 to 8 cts each; rhubarb, 2 to 4 cents per lb; codfish, 25 to 65 cents; mackerel, 5 to 8 cents; pigs \$2.50 to \$5.00 per pair; apples, 10 cents per dozen.

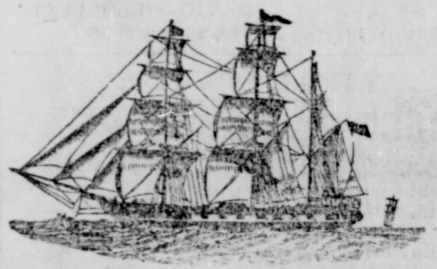
