3-Month Jail Sentence For Hampering Police

A jail sentence of three months was handed down by Magistrate K. M. Martin in City Police Court against a city resident charged obstructing a police officer in the execution of his duties. A total of 16 cases appeared on yesterday's docket. Of eight drunk and incapable, four were sentenced to 30 days in jail, two to ten days imprisonment, one was fined \$5, and costs, and a warrant was ordered for the eighth, who failed to appear. A vagrant was sentenced to 60 days in jail and the case of a person charged with being drunk and disorderly was remanded for one week. Of four taxi drivers, appearing on charges of parking in spaces other than those provided by the taxi stand, two were fined \$10 and costs each and the others \$5, and costs each. All were given the warning by Magistrate Martin that if this infraction occurs too often future violators may be subject to cancellation of their licenses. In the final case, a summons was ordered in the case of a person who failed to appear on a charge of failing to stop at a red light.

O'Leary Added To Imperial Oil Expansion Program On Island

The fourth Imperial Oil bulk storage plant to be opened on Prince Edward Island within a week was officially opened at O'Leary last Friday night by Dr. George Dewar, M.L.A. Other plants have been opened recently at Souris, Montague and Albany. The Imperial Oil Company now has nine such plants operating in the Province. The O'Leary opening took place at the Legion Hall and was attended by upwards of 250 people. Catering was under the direction of the O'Leary Hospital Ladies' Auxiliary. Mr. R.A. Carroll of Halifax, Superintendent of Farm Trade for Imperial Oil outlined the changes taking place in the expanding oil industry. He said, "As Canada continues to expand, the petroleum industry will continue to keep pace with progress." The Chairman of the meeting was Mr. H.L. Milligan, Charlottetown. Mr. J.H. Cerry, resident manager for Prince Edward Island, outlined the various Imperial oil products being used in Prince Edward Island and stated that this modern plant at O'Leary would handle the distribution of products for that area. The new plant will be operated by Mr. James Harris, O'Leary. The Imperial Oil Company is now completing its large Marine Storage plant at the East end of Charlottetown.

Sees Province Facing Grave Crisis In Field Of Education

That this Province is facing a grave crisis in the field of education was the conclusion reached by an interested group meeting at the Teacher's Federation Office Tuesday afternoon. Representatives were present from several provincial organizations—Home and School Association, the Teacher's Federation, the Women's Institute, the Catholic Women's League, the I.O.E., the Board of Trade, the Federation of Agriculture, the Music Festival Association.

In the opinion of the meeting one factor in particular appeared responsible for this critical situation—the acute shortage of trained teachers, which has resulted in the hiring each year of more untrained personnel, many of whom are unable to cope with the manifold responsibilities demanded of them. As one delegate put it, "We are scraping the bottom of the barrel, and it is time the public were made aware of the facts, before it is too late."
