

Student Use Of Library Checked In Evenings

Confederation Centre Chief Librarian, Doug Boylan, Monday announced a new policy to control student use of library facilities during evening hours. The new policy is designed to ensure adequate reading and research facilities for adult patrons.

"It's great to be popular with the younger set," said Mr. Boylan, "the trouble is, we're getting just too popular during evening hours and adults are finding all the reading tables occupied when they arrive."

"It seems many students are using the library as a convenient place to do their home work, and the homework sessions are turning into social gatherings. The result is that those who come in for quiet reading and legitimate research are having problems in finding a place to carry on these activities for which a library is primarily designed."

"I'm afraid that because of this situation, we're going to have to control student usage of the library during evening hours by instituting a desk card system, which will permit a limited number of students to occupy desk space. In the afternoons, the library will be wide open for student use and we'll have professional librarians on hand to help with any problems. The new policy will only apply to evening hours but it will be rigidly enforced."

Mr. Boylan explained that the desk card system would involve picking up a card from the circulation counter which would be carried by the student to the study desk and kept during the study and research session. On leaving the library the student will surrender the card to the circulation desk. Twenty-five cards will be in circulation at any one time during the evening, and the students may utilize any desk not reserved for newspaper or periodical reading.

Giving Painting To Building Trust
