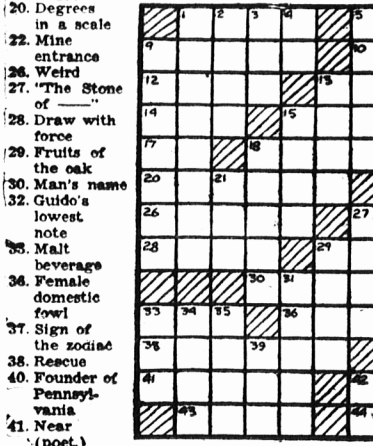
Mr. and Mrs. Allan Palmer, Summerside, were guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Palmer on Sept. 27.
