

England and Burmah.

We presume that England's next little war will be with his Majesty of Burmah, who has been on a protracted spree for several months and whose conduct has been that of a maniac, whose mania is a thirst for human blood. King Theebaw, it seems, is not content with spreading demoralization in his own Province, but has agents in British territory, whose mission is to foment insurrection. This will probably determine the course of the British Government towards him. Indeed it is stated by some of the English journals that had it not been for the Afghan campaign Theebaw would have been dethroned long ago, but the necessity of dealing with a greater man Sher Ali saved him for the time. His conduct, however, then and since, has been such as to entirely alienate his subjects and prove his unfitness to rule. A war with Burmah would be a very small matter, for Theebaw's army is a rabble, and would probably desert him in a body. British Burmah is now a flourishing and prosperous dependency of India, and the territory which Theebaw governs so badly might be made equally prosperous under British rule.

Practical Ending of the War in Afghanistan.

The Afghanistan campaign has been an inglorious one for the enemies of the British. The Cabul revolt was evidently conceived in stupidity and the movements of the revolters have been attended with mismanagement or cowardice, perhaps both. For all of which the Beaconsfield Cabinet must be truly thankful. Gen. Roberts reached Cabul on Wednesday, instead of Tuesday as was expected, and the citadel was immediately evacuated by the hostile Afghans. Cable despatches from London are as follows:—

"A despatch, dated Simla, Friday, midnight, says:—Gen. Roberts was before Cabul on the 8th inst. General Baker and MacPherson have been detailed in strength to attack the enemy, who have assembled from above Balchissar. If these forces can be brought into action, Gen. Roberts thinks the enemy will be able to make another sight. Massy who was sent to cut off the retreat of the Afghans on the road between Bannia and Kohistan, captured seventy-eight guns in Spaluz. The guns were found in an abandoned entrenchment, and among them were seven Armstrong's.

"The 'Standard's' despatch from Benihessar, near Cabul, dated at a late hour on the 8th inst., says: 'News has been received that the citadel and palace of Balchissar in Cabul have been evacuated by the enemy. There will probably be no further resistance, and a peaceful entry will immediately take place.'

The Russians, meantime, have been on the alert, and since the complete success of the British has been assured, have been planning to secure the leniency of England. According to the London 'Standard's' information from Berlin, Russian overtures to England relative to Afghanistan, have either been, or are about to be, made. The Czar desires the assurance that England will not occupy Herat or the Bodakshan Plateau.

An Advertising Fiend.

A unique incident occurred at Baldwin's Theatre the other evening, which was not down in the bills, and which sharply illustrates the proverbial push and ingenuity of certain San Francisco advertisers. It appears that the advertising agent of a well-known Kearney street auction house had engaged one of the upper stage boxes for Thursday evening, and a few minutes after the doors were opened the ushers were paralyzed at beholding a large canvas transparency being expeditiously and quietly erected in said box, and bearing on its surface, in two-foot letters, the familiar legend, "Try Guffey's Condensed Chowder!" They at once hurried to the box and begged the occupant to desist. That enterprising individual simply shrugged his shoulders and went calmly on lighting wax tapers for his illumination. The manager himself rushed breathlessly to the spot and ordered the agent to leave the house.

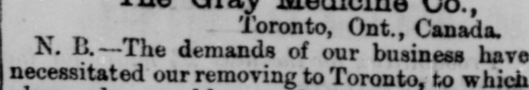
