South dealer.  
North-South vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
♠ A J 8 7  
♥ 10 8  
♦ Q 10 8 5  
♣ K Q 5

**WEST**  
♠ 5 2  
♥ K J 5 3  
♦ 9 8 7 5  
♣ 9 8 3

**EAST**  
♠ 6 4 3  
♥ 9 7 4 3  
♦ A K J 4  
♣ 7 4

**SOUTH**  
♠ K Q 10 9  
♥ A Q 8  
♦ 7

The bidding:  
South West North East  
1♠ Pass 1♠ Pass  
1♥ Pass 2♥ Pass  
4NT Pass 5♠ Pass  
6♠

Opening lead—nine of diamonds.

Suppose you're declarer at six spades. East wins the ten of diamonds with the jack and returns a high diamond which you trump. How do you play the hand?

The first reaction probably is to draw trumps, intending to run the club suit, discard a heart from dummy, and trump two hearts in dummy. But then you realize this won't work because you would have to draw three rounds of trumps, dummy would have only one left, and you can't ruff two hearts with one trump.
