LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

SUPREME COURT.—Today the rule for a new trial in the Gillis-Martin case was refused.

B. I. S. CONCERT.—The Benevolent Irish Society, assisted by some of the best local talent of the city, will give a concert in St. Patrick's Hall on Thursday evening the 18th inst.

THE WEATHER.—Winds shifting to south and east, and increasing to strong breezes and gales during the night or early on Friday. Fair today but becoming unsettled and rainy again.

FOR THE WEST INDIES.—The schr. Elma sailed today for the West Indies with a cargo which included 2100 bags oats, 1200 bris. potatoes, 27 bales hay, and 600 turkeys and geese, shipped by Carvell Bros. She also had 43 horses, 8 cows and 46 sheep shipped by different persons.

SHEEP AND LAMBS.—Mr. C. A. McNutt shipped 190 sheep and lambs to Messrs. Falkin & Mason, Apohaqui, N. B., on Monday.

Mr. S. H. Jones shipped 655 sheep and lambs by the Northumberland on Wednesday morning to Boston.—Summerside Farmer.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—During a thunder and lightning storm which prevailed on Saturday night lightning struck the barn of Robert Kelly, Indian Mountain, about ten miles from Moncton, tearing off the boards, killing one cow and badly injuring another.

ILLEGAL LOBSTER FISHING.—Before A. Lord, Esq., Fishery Officer, Amos Lantz of Point Prim, was convicted of two charges of fishing lobsters out of season, and in each case was fined \$70 and costs. William Finlayson and Donald N. Murchison, also of Point Prim, confessed to infractions of the same law and each was fined \$20 and cost.

BODY FLOATING.—We hear that during the progress of the storm yesterday the captain of the bark Cosmo, lying in the stream, observed the lifeless body of a man floating in the river, apparently moving in the direction of Brick-maker's Point. It was too stormy at the time for the captain to do anything in the way of looking after the body. The body was dressed in dark clothes. It would be well for the authorities to send out a search party.

FASTER THAN THE MINT.—An amusing joke was played yesterday on a Monctonian who is interested in mining. Mr. Ansbach the German Magician, visited his office and noticing samples of mineral deposits, picked a piece of copper ore up and asked: "Is this copper?" Being replied in the affirmative he broke a piece off and apparently ate it. After smacking his lips with apparent relish he said: "I guess it is," and then shook his right leg and a cent rolled out on the floor. It was certainly very speedy transformation.—Moncton Transcript.

AFTER MANY YEARS.—A romantic story comes from Russellville, Ky. It seems that though they loved each other fifty years or more ago, J. W. Chandler, seventy-six years old, of Buckville, and Nancy Belcher, seventy-four years old, were married only Tuesday. Each had married another, but in all that time had cherished a remnant of the first love. They had been sweethearts in childhood, and then lovers. A quarrel came and they parted, and in time each married. Both had been left alone in the world for several years. At last they decided to reunite the love that had been separated half a century ago.

THE NIGHT HAWK CLUB is once again comfortably housed in their old quarters. The old staff of officers are again on deck and everything promises for a successful season's work. Financially the Club holds a commanding position. Among the assets they enumerate a noble specimen of the equine race, which, with the merry-go-round it is intended to purchase next spring, will admirably tend towards the pleasure of the members during the summer months. DAMAGE BY THE STORM.—The storm of yesterday afternoon was very severe east, and the railway bridges at Marie and St. Peters suffered. The damage to the first-mentioned structure was not very great, but about fifty feet of the bridge at St. Peters was washed away. The structure was impassable for trains until this afternoon about one o'clock, by which time it was sufficiently repaired to admit of the passage of the accommodation train. The train which left here yesterday afternoon did not get beyond St. Peters starch factory, and returned to the city from that place this morning. Trains passed over the bridge at Marie last night and this morning.

The storm was also severely felt in Summerside. According to the correspondent of the Guardian part of the breastwork at the west end of the town was carried away making the street impassible. Queen's wharf was badly damaged in several places, and will need a good deal of repair. The railway wharf also was badly swept, and undermined in several places, making the track somewhat dangerous. The warehouses on railway wharf were pretty badly flooded, a large section of the floor being lifted by the seas and one of the doors beaten in.

THE QUEEN BEHIND THE FINGER.

Miss Lillian Bell, who is narrating her impressions of the Old World and its people for the Ladies' Home Journal, writes from London, in the November issue of that magazine: "I have seen the Houses of Parliament and the Tower and Westminster Abbey, and the World's Fair, but the most impressive sight I ever beheld is the upraised hand of a London policeman. I never heard one of them speak except when spoken to. But let one little blue-coated man raise his forefinger and every vehicle on wheels stops, and stons instantly, stops in obedience to law and order, stops without swearing or gesticulating or abuse; stops with no under-handed trying to drive out of line and get by on the other side, just stops, that is the end of it. And why? Because the Queen of England is behind that raised finger. Why a London policeman has more power than our President. Even the Queen's coachmen obey; that is what makes liberty."

"I am the most flamboyant of Americans, the most hopelessly addicted to my own country, but I must admit that I had my first real taste of liberty in England. I will tell you why. We make our laws, and then most industriously set about studying out a plan by which we may evade them. America is suffering, as all republics must of necessity suffer, from liberty in the hands of the multitude. The multitude are ignorant, and liberty in the hands of the ignorant is always license."

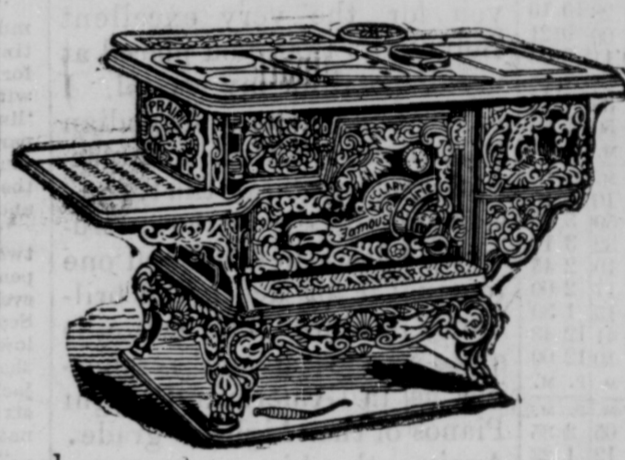
