Woodcock Tapering Off Training For Big Fight

Cardinals Win Q.S.S. Baseball Semi-Finals

The Cardinals captured the semi-final playoff series of the Queen Square School Baseball League yesterday afternoon when they smothered the Indians under a 15-3 defeat and took the best of three series in two straight games.

The Cardinals won the opening game on Monday by a narrow 2-1 count, and will now meet the Red Sox in the finals for the School championship, which will commence here on Friday.

It was a walkaway victory for the Cards, who behind the four-armed pitching of C. MacDonald, picked up four runs in the first inning, two in the third, one in the fifth and finished it off with a powerful eight run rally in the sixth for their 12-run margin of victory. The Indians were held runless for the first three innings, but broke through for a run in each of the three succeeding innings for their full total.

Clee Gillis, first sacker for the Cards, came up with the only triple of the game.

MacDonald, the winning pitcher, allowed four hits and struck out seven, while the loser, A. MacLeod, struck out 12 and allowed eight hits. The Cards chalked up one error and the Indians two.

LONDON, May 31 — (Reuters) — Loaded with lucky charms and crammed with confidence, Bruce Woodcock, Britain's best hope in years to gain world championship heavyweight boxing laurels, has started tapering off training at his camp at Gwrych Castle, Wales.

The one-time railwayman meets Lee Savold of the United States at the White City Stadium here Tuesday night in a bout for what the world title.

From Scarborough, Yorkshire, training quarters of the American contestant, also came claims of superb condition and extreme confidence as the drum-beating duet entered its final week.

Bill Daly, Savold's manager, recalling the last time the pair met in the fourth round — boasted to reporters that "Bruce can do what he likes to see; kick him, stick his thumb in his eye or anything else and we won't claim a foul."

Meantime Tom Hurst, Woodcock's mentor, was telling newspaper men that Woodcock now was down to 190 1-2 pounds and planned to lay off road and ring work for a day in order not to sink below fighting weight the night of the fight.

Savold figures 50,000 fans will pack into the big West London Greyhound Stadium and will chalk \$85,000 (\$283,500) into the coffers.

South African Wins World Boxing Title

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, May 31 — (Reuters) — Vic Toweel, South African champion, tonight won the world bantamweight boxing title by beating the titleholder, Manuel Ortiz, of California, on points over 15 rounds.

The South African weighed 116 pounds 12 ounces. Ortiz weighed 117 pounds two ounces.

It was only the 13th pro fight for Toweel, who won the British Empire 118-pound crown from Stan Rowan of England last November.

The 33-year-old Ortiz had held the world title for nearly eight years except for a two-month period in 1947. The California Mexican first gained the crown in 1942 when he beat Lou Salica. He lost it to Harold Dade Jan. 8, 1947, but won back the title from the Chicagoan two months later.

Jockey Rae Johnstone New Toast Of Britain

LONDON, May 31 — (Reuters) — Rae (Snapper) Johnstone, the jockey who couldn't get a ride for 16 years, today was the toast of the turf world.

Critics couldn't find enough superlatives to commend the brilliance with which he nursed home the non-staying Galador in Saturday's Derby over Epsom Downs' 1-1/2 mile switchback course to gain a head decision from the American-bred and owned Prince Simon.

The applause was sweet music for 45-year-old Rae. He's known the sound of boos and jeers as he rode back after losing the greatest of all English thoroughbred classics.

The anvil chorus was loudest in 1934 when Johnstone, up on Lord Glanely's Colombo — Two Thousand and Guineas victor and 11-to-8 Derby favorite — was beaten into third place behind Windsor Lad and Easton.

The verdict was that Charlie Smirk on the winner and Gordon (The Champ) Richards on the second had given Johnstone a lesson in big-race tactics. He might have been a fair jockey in his native Australia, but when the chips were down in a big British event he just didn't rate among the top-notchers, race-golders said.

Lord Glanely cancelled Johnstone's retainer and a chastened Rae went to France where he twice topped the list of winning riders, but from where he made only occasional sorties to Britain.

But the wheel turned again. British bloodstock became inferior during the war, French owners made more and more frequent raids across the Channel and Johnstone was generally chosen to carry the Gallic colors in the English classics.

He finally won an English Derby in 1949, astride the Aga Khan's My Love.

The same season he accomplished an unprecedented "triple" by scoring also in the French Derby on Bey and the Irish Derby by Noor.

Last year his luck wasn't too good in the Derby and he placed second in a photo finish.

Fish & Game Ass'n Branch Formed At Montague

On Monday night, May 29, first meeting for the organizing of a Kings County Branch of the Fish and Game Protection Association was held in the Legion Hall at Montague, with Mr. Stewart Jones, President of the Provincial Association, presiding.

A very large representation of interested sportsmen attended from many localities in the county.

Before the discussion took place a very interesting film, showing the releasing of chukker partridge, quail and pheasants was shown by Mr. Frank Acorn. This gave the audience an appreciation of the work now being done to increase and develop the upland game of P. E. I. and also the rising interest of the youth in game protection.

Mr. Jones then outlined the purpose of the meeting, stating that it was his expectation that the formation of county branches would increase the interest in the Association, and consequently, give more support to future recommendations.

Mr. Harold Shaw, Queens County president, urged the formation of a branch in Kings County, stating that since its formation in Queens County, the membership had doubled, and went on to give a brief idea of what the branch had done since its formation.

Mr. Dick Found of Summerside, gave a brief outline of the formation and history of the Prince County branch, and urged a similar one for Kings County.

Mr. Keir Clark, M. L. A. brought to the attention of the meeting, that for the past few summers the Valleyfield stream has been polluted through the deposition of mud by the washing of gravel at the head of the stream. He stated that the fish, to a large extent, have by-passed this stream as a spawning ground, and the actual fishing is very poor. It was of little use building hatcheries, if commercial projects such as this were permitted to ruin streams, and nothing could be done to prevent this continuing indefinitely.

It was, furthermore, very unfortunate that a solution of the mutual satisfaction of all could not be worked out.

Mr. S. S. Hessian, K. C., stated that the organization was proceeding in the right direction in forming county branches, and that such a branch in Kings County was a necessity in order to look after its interests, and lend its support to provincial recommendations.

Mr. Russell MacDonald, another sportsman who has been interested in fish and game for many years, urged members to respect the wishes of the farmer regarding his property while hunting thereon.

Mr. Frank Acorn told the audience that the money used for development purposes, came from the sportsmen, and every attempt was made to develop fishing as well as up-land game, but that fishing improvements required considerable more work. He requested farmers to report any hunter who did not respect his property as he should, and steps would be taken to have the matter looked into.

Mr. Peter McLellan, Fisheries Inspector, stated that such an organization would go far in developing the fish and game of Kings County, and urged its formation.

Mr. Earl Ings, Farmers' Federation, urged that the children in the school should be taught conservation and protection, since they would be the sportsmen of the future.

Mr. Harry Webster, Dominion Wild Life Service, stated that such organization determined to a great extent, the setting of hunting and fishing dates, and other policies, and only the voice of a representative body might expect immediate consideration.

NEWCOMERTOWN, O., May 28 — (AP) — Denton True (Cy) Young, credited with pitching and winning more major-league ball games than any other hurler, was honored today by 3,000 friends at the formal dedication of Cy Young Park. The 83-year-old hurler, in 22 years in the majors, played in 373 games and won 511 for an all-time record. His nearest rival was Walter Johnson, who in 21 years won 403 of 801 games he pitched.
