MONTREAL, (CP)—A 220-pound workman escaped death Tuesday in an 80-foot plunge from the sixth floor of a downtown garage building.

The workman, Hector Tremblay, 42, was taken to hospital for observation. Doctors believe he may have escaped with only a fractured ankle.

## \$4,000,000 Road In Gatineau Park

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Federal District Commission plans a 50-mile stretch of highway through beautiful Gatineau Park.

### LINK BEAUTY SPOTS

The road will link the park's beauty spots and make them easily accessible. Starting from the western outskirts of Hull, Que., it will snake through the park, circle it and come back, 50 miles later, to the starting point.

"We will keep the park as close to the way God made it as possible," park superintendent E. S. Richards said.

However, the Federal District Commission has improved on nature in many ways. Sprinkled throughout the park are tables and benches for picnickers, colored to blend with the surroundings.

East Picnic Spot, there are outdoor fireplaces. The PDC even provides wood for fires, "so no wood-chipper would chop our trees."

The park is webbed with 100 miles of footpaths. Boats and tents can be rented at Lac Philippe, a lake about three miles long, at the uppermost end of the park.

## Students Return To Red China

HONG KONG, (Reuters)—Forty-one Chinese repatriated from the United States crossed the Hong Kong border today into Communist China.

Officials said all were Chinese who wanted to return to China, but included some that the U. S. had deported. Most were students who had completed their studies in the U. S.

It was understood that their return was not part of prearranged exchange, but observers here thought the American initiative in preparing them had some significance in the light of the coming visit to Peking of the United Nations secretary-general, Dag Hammarskjöld, for discussions on the release of the 17 American airmen sentenced as spies.
