Ch'town Will Become Oil Shipment Centre

With the opening of the new Texaco Company of Canada's bulk storage plant at the foot of Great George Street, on or about November 4, Charlottetown will become a major port for the handling of petroleum products in the Gulf of St. Lawrence area, and particularly the Northumberland Strait.

J. David Stewart the district manager for the company, explained that the new plant will feature two angles new to the province and another which could well turn out to be new.

Another phase of the plant operations will be the setting up of a bunkering station for all classes of sea going ships. This will prove a boon to all steamship lines which operate in Northumberland Strait waters.

Under this new set-up deep sea and coastal oil burning ships, regardless of size, will be able to fill up their operational tanks. Up until the establishment of this plant service, ship previously, to obtain sufficient quantities of operational fuel were required to sail long distances to some mainland port for bunkering.

In referring to the size or draft of ships which will be able to use the bunkering facilities at the company wharf, Mr. Stewart said the master of any ship need have no fear of possible groundings as the location of the mooring piers provides about 36 feet of water, which is several feet greater than at the Railway Wharf.

Another facility being installed will see pleasure craft being serviced in almost the same manner as is employed at automobile service stations. A small landing

Steps Taken To Improve Fishing Industry Outlined

"We are convinced we can make the fisheries of our province a much closer second to our very efficient agricultural industry than is now the case," Eugene Gorman, provincial deputy minister of fisheries asserted, in addressing the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"With a prolific sea—every mile likely productive—bounding our coastline of about 1,100 miles, we are not satisfied with a fisheries turnover of approximately 10-15% of the agricultural value. If we gear ourselves to get our share of the harvest that awaits us in our seas, we will expand our fishery economy as it has never been done before. The market awaits us," he said.

fisheries with hand-lines, set lines and set nets for mackerel and herring; and finally, a recent introduction has been the use of sink gill nets for the catching of groundfish.

In our own province, other trawling as carried on by 13 boats and 65 men, accounts for about half the groundfish landings.

"Fish is a commodity without price supports, and without troublesome carryover stocks. Moreover, fish as we prepare it today, is doing an increasingly better job of competing for the consumer's food dollar."

"Present developments have been the product of these main technological revolutions in modern fishing," Mr. Gorman continued as he went on to describe mechanization, the development of echo ranging and echo sounding and the advent of synthetic fibres.

DEEP SEA CLAMS "We must search out new and more efficient methods if we are to remain competitive. Within the limited resources of a small province we are working in this direction," Mr. Gorman said as he described the application of efficient methods in other countries, now being tried here.

He said he was proud to state that P.E.I. leads the other 16 auxiliaries in Canada in per capita giving. Other members of the clergy present were Rev. W. Burton Crowe of Park Royal, Rev. H.L. Milton of First Baptist.

"The sea environment covers more than 70 per cent of the earth's surface, occupying about 90 million square miles of area. Authorities claim that excluding insects, 80 per cent of known animal forms live in the sea. Yet from this tremendous area, from this 330 billion cu. miles of life-sustaining environment, only ten percent of humanity's food is produced."
