AT ROCKY POINT PICNIC yesterday a young man who fell asleep on the picnic grounds found on rising that he had been relieved of the sum of \$32.00.

MISS DUER's sentence, to pay a fine of \$500, for killing her beloved friend, Miss Hearn, is one of the strangest verdicts ever given by a jury in the United States.

MESSRS. DAWSON AND LePAGE displayed for sale in the market to-day a number of full grown cauliflowers. This is something extraordinary as cauliflowers do not come in regularly till August.

AT Toronto on Saturday last, Edward Thickpenny, for the murder of Catherine Thompson, in Markham Township, in April last was sentenced to be hanged on the 12th Sept. next.

A NEW and dangerous counterfeit \$5 legal tender note has appeared in Western New York. It is of the series of 1875, and bears names of Allison, register, Wyman, treasurer. The notes were probably issued from some Canadian point.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—The barkentine Forest Princess, of Truro, N. S., Capt. Cumming, which was cleared at Halifax on Thursday for London, by Mr. I. H. Mathers, took 11,373 cases of lobsters and other cargo, making a total value of \$71,650.80.

REV. D. HICKEY, a native of this Island, and formerly connected with the press of this city, who left the Methodist ministry two years ago and joined the Congregationalist Church, was readmitted to the Nova Scotia Methodist Conference on Saturday.

It is worthy of note that to-morrow (June 25th)—the day on which the Methodist Conference meets in this city—is the anniversary of the first Methodist Conference which was held in England ninety-five years ago—or on the 25th June, 1784.

A DESPATCH from Carp, about twenty miles from Ottawa, says excellent specimens of gold have been found on the land of Mr. James Wilson of that village. Wilson had them tested by an expert, and was assured by that gentleman that the sand really contained gold in paying quantities.

A FESTIVAL was held at Nelson, Northumberland County, N. B., on Friday last, in honor of the Rev. Michael Egan, who had attained the anniversary of the fiftieth year of his priesthood. Archbishop Hannan, of Halifax, Bishop Rogers, of Chatham, and other ecclesiastics were present. Many valuable presents were made the venerable clergyman.
