LONDON (AP) — The Soviet Union Friday night announced the award of its highest honor to Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, currently debating the Berlin crisis with his Western opposite numbers in Geneva. Moscow radio said the supreme Soviet (Parliament) gave Gromyko the Order of Lenin "for highly meritorious services to the Soviet state and in connection with his 50th birthday." Gromyko was born July 6, 1908.

TODAY'S TREAT

MEAT LOAF

3 cups cooked rice
2 lbs hamburger
1 cup dried green peppers or green tomato chow
1/4 cup chopped onion.
1/4 cups cooked or canned tomatoes
2 tsp. salt.
1/4 tsp. pepper.

Mix together all ingredients and turn into 11 x 7 inch baking dish. Score top of loaf with knife and mark off servings. Bake in oven (375 degrees F.) for one hour and 10 minutes, or until done. Serves 8 to 10.

SANDWICH FILLINGS

(No. 1.) Diced hard cooked eggs with minced onion, moistened with mayonnaise.

(No. 2.) Diced chicken or turkey and diced celery combined with mayonnaise.

(No. 3.) Soft cream cheese with chopped olives and pimiento.

(No. 4.) Pimiento cream cheese and a little diced green pepper or chopped parsley.

(No. 5.) Minced ham and chopped celery moistened with a little prepared mustard or sweet mustard relish.
