NEW YORK (AP) — Tommy Davis of Los Angeles Dodgers moved up to 323 to beat seven safeties in 19 runs. Kaline also gained an excellent chance of becoming the first National League player more than a decade to win two consecutive batting championships.

The Alouettes won't be facing a weakened Calgary team.

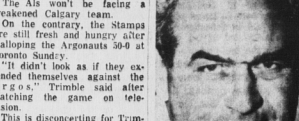
On the contrary, the Stamps are still fresh and hungry after winning the Argonauts 20-0 at Toronto Sunday.

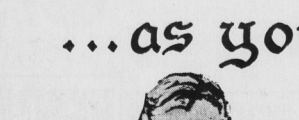
