

### Hollinger Mines Increase Profits

TORONTO, (CP) — Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Limited net profit for 1952 increased to

\$1,904,657 from \$1,486,826 in 1951. It was reported Thursday. Earnings per share rose to 38.7 cents from 30.2 cents and gold production was \$11,179,398 compared with \$9,761,213. The company received an Emergency Gold Mining Assistance bonus of \$798,912 and additional income of \$400,880.

### Let's Talk It Over

The second quarter of the twentieth century might be called the era of the service clubs. Such an organization, thoroughly grounded in common sense and courtesy on the highway would do more to remedy our highway problem than any regulations the legislators make, as wise and judicious as these undoubtedly are.

All three clubs, Y's Men, Kinsmen and Rotary, support the Little Leagues of baseball here, and were it not for the Kinsmen efforts to provide hockey for the children and skating for everyone this past winter, the winter situation for youth recreation, bleak as it is, would have been a great deal bleaker. The Kinsmen also look after the children at Halloween, making sure that they have a great time, without getting into too much mischief.

These clubs do much more than has been mentioned above. They have guiding fingers in many promotional pies that are cooked up for the benefit of our communities. Long may they continue to flourish.
