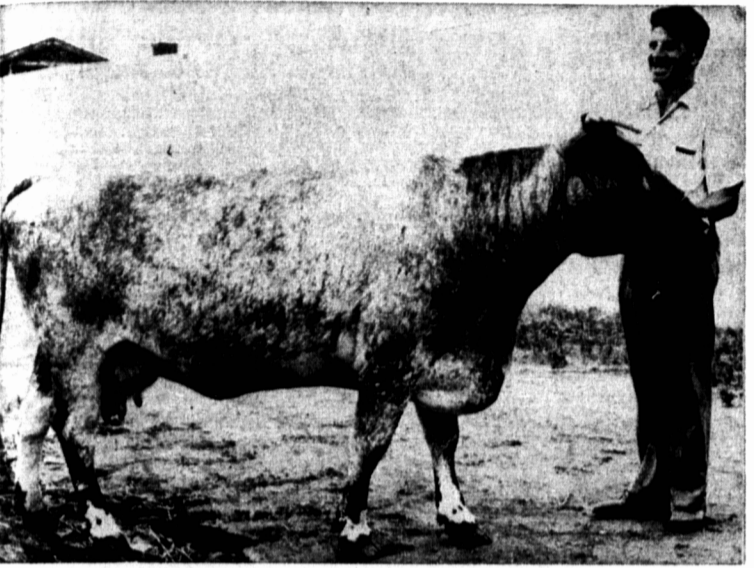


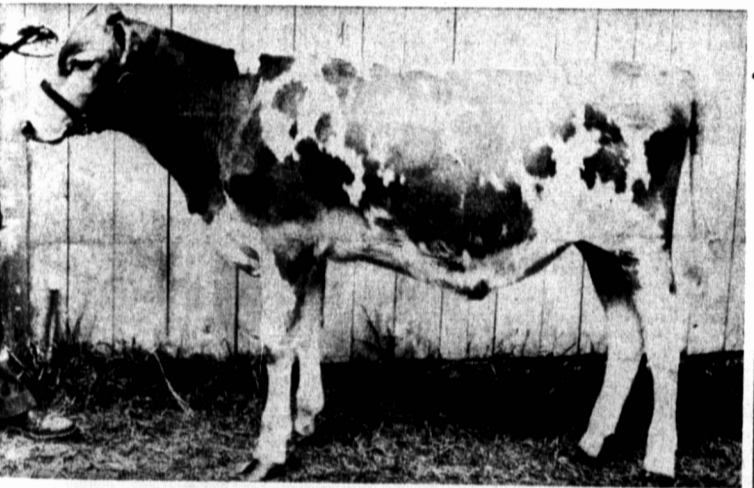
LOADS PULP AT NEWPORT

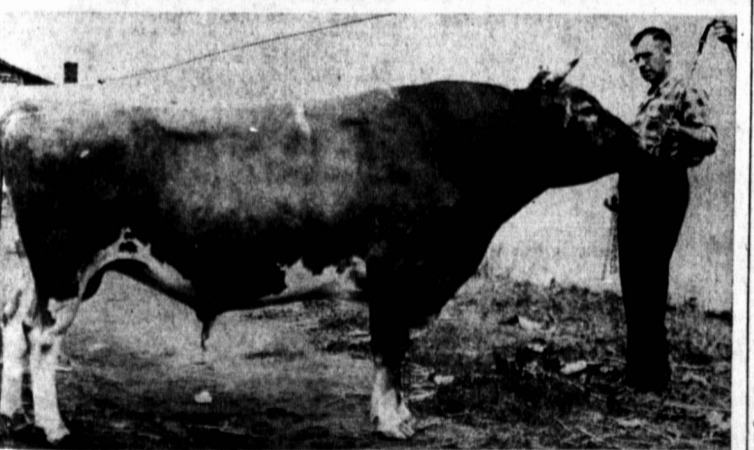
DUEL PURPOSE FEMALE CHAMP

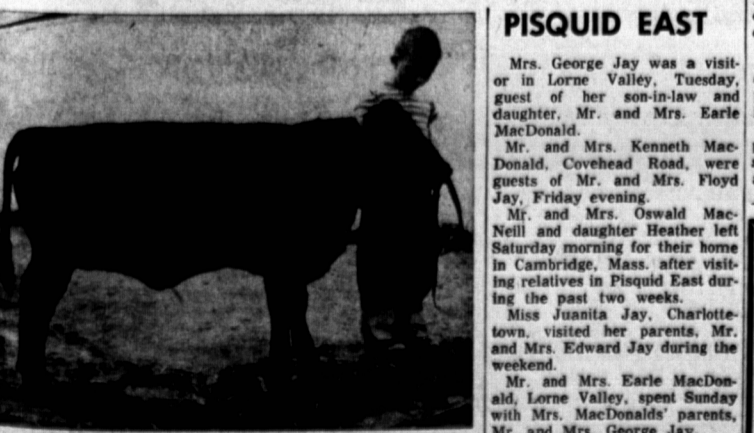
JUNIOR GUERNSEY CHAMPION

TORONTO (CP)—W. H. Bouck, president of New Brunswick Uranium Metals and Mining Ltd., said Thursday a base-metal exploration project in the Hamstead, N.B., area, has been dropped.

The project was carried out by the company in partnership with Rio Canadian Exploration Ltd., exploration arm of Rio Tinto Mining Company of Canada Ltd.
