Strange But True

Children may some day be born of fathers dead for centuries. Sounds fantastic, doesn't it? But this startling bit of news was flashed to the British Association for the Advancement of Science by no less a person than Dr. A. S. Parkes of the National Institute for Medical Research.

Of course, live mothers would have to be used to carry out such a scientific plan. And for the present, that's that.

I have written in this column before about strange dreams that came true. Now let me tell you about the "Chaffin Will Case," on record both in the state of North Carolina and the American Society for Psychical Research.

James Chaffin was a farmer who lived in Davie County, N. C. He had a wife and four sons — of the sons, Marshall was the favorite.

On September 7, 1921, Farmer Chaffin died, as the result of a fall downstairs, and, on September 24, Marshall Chaffin obtained probate of the will. It was not contested by the remaining members of the family because they felt sure it was a valid document.

On the night of June 4, 1925, one of the sons, James Chaffin, dreamed he saw his father standing beside his bed. He was dressed in his usual farm togs, and wore a long black coat.

Together John and James got the old coat and sure enough they came upon an inside pocket which had been sewed up. When they'd cut the stitches they were amazed to find a bit of yellowed paper on which was written, in the familiar scrawl of their father's, this message:

"Read the 27th chapter of Genesis in my daddy's old Bible." Incidentally, the daddy referred to was a clergyman and the old Bible mentioned was not hard to find because it was a treasured family heirloom.

"After reading the 27th Chapter of Genesis, I, James L. Chaffin, do make my last will and testament, and here it is. I want after giving my body a decent burial, my property to be equally divided between my four sons, if they are living at my death, both personal and real estate divided equal, if not living, with share going to their children.

Although this second will was unattested, it was legal in the state where it was drawn up if it could be proved that the handwriting was that of James Chaffin, deceased. It was proved beyond the shadow of a doubt.

There were those who accused James Jr., of forging the second will but handwriting experts vindicated him.
