## Hedard Robichaud Supports Liberal Candidate in Kings

GEORGETOWN — Upwards of 150 persons were on hand to hear Hedard Robichaud speak in support of John Mullaly, Liberal candidate in Kings County, at a meeting here yesterday afternoon.

The Liberal candidate for reelection in Kings County, Mr. Robichaud said if the prime minister is in good health, the same can't be said for the country.

Mr. Mullaly and Thomas J. Kichham, Souris also addressed the gathering in the evening with Mr. Mullaly emphasizing the need for a stable, decisive government in Ottawa "that will restore confidence both at home and abroad."

He maintained that the Liberal party platform was not one "cooked up for the election," but a full four-year program. "The answer to Canada's present ills," Mr. Mullaly pledged himself, if elected, to "work very, very hard to attempt to bring to Georgetown some industry or other means to bring employment and prosperity to the people of the area."

Designating unemployment and the depletion of the unemployment insurance fund as one ill of the country under Conservative government, Mr. Robichaud assured the people that "as long as there is a Liberal vote in the country we will make sure fishermen remain under the Unemployment Insurance Act."

Noting that everything "was rosy" until shortly before announcement of austerity measures, he said he was confident of the existence of a monetary crisis, the speaker questioned how a government could be forced "overnight" to introduce such measures.

Referring to the Atlantic Development Board as nothing but an advisory board, with no representatives of the fishing industry, he said the board was "a waste of money" and "Abide With Me" was sung.

## National YPC Planning 1964 Convention Here

Presenting his report to the annual meeting of the Queens County Young Progressive Conservative Association, Gerald Driscoll, retiring president, said that the 1964 national convention of the YPC is slated to be held in Charlottetown.

Mr. Driscoll said that a resolution to this effect had been passed at the recent national convention held in Ottawa, which was a delegate.

"No dates have yet been fixed for this gathering," he said, "neither has a convention hall been selected." He noted that a meeting such as this will bring somewhere between 400 and 500 people into the city and will consume the greater part of one week.

**NEW CLUB**

Mr. Driscoll also announced that during the past year the YPC has organized active club in the Fourth District of Queens, the first president of which is John MacMillan, Alberly Plains.

The principal speaker of the meeting was Heath MacQuarrie, one of the PC candidates in Kings County, who said the Liberal Party is not facing up to the real issues of the election.

Mr. MacQuarrie claimed that the numerous gimmicks and devices being used by the Liberals are being looked upon by serious minded Canadians and leading newspapers as making a farce of the election campaign.

On the subject of the devaluation of the Canadian dollar, Mr. MacQuarrie quoted from the report submitted by the government of the Bank of Canada, in which that leading economist and banker had high praise of the steps taken by the Diefenbaker government.

Offering his congratulations to the retiring executive, he expressed appreciation for the close co-operation he had always received from the YPC and hoped that this situation will continue to exist under the new executive.

Others who spoke briefly were H. Bennett Carr, provincial secretary and a past president of the national YPC, Hon. M.A. Farmer, QC, provincial treasurer and attorney-general, Les Gillis, president of St. Dunstan's University YPC Club, Urban Laughton, Sherbrooke, past provincial president, and Mrs. Gerald Madigan, representative of the Women's Progressive Conservative Association.

Other reports heard were treasurer's Allison Carr, secretary James Lee, and members of the executive.

## Souris Sees Close Election As PCs And Liberals Meet

**SOURIS** — If the 1st District of Kings in any indication, the election race will be a close one as more than 500 persons attended each of two political meetings in Souris last night.

The Liberal rally was held in the Souris Regional High School auditorium while the Progressive Conservatives met in St. Mary's parish hall.

In addressing the Liberal rally, the Kings candidate John Mullaly stressed his farming, back-ground and his close association in the past seven years with the fishing industry as qualifications for him being able to help those industries in the country.

He elaborated on Liberal policy in connection with defence social welfare and the great need for a new economy in Canada.

The rally was chaired by Major read, Rollo Bay, president of the Kings County Liberal Association.

T. J. Kichham, Souris West, introduced the guest speaker, Hedard Robichaud who said the "PC government of the last year was unstable, unstable and unsettled," and depended on such parties as the Social Credit party to stay in power.

Mr. Robichaud said the Liberal party promised a 12-mile limit on fishing and that fishermen who are unable to penetrate the Atlantic Ocean also spoke.

At the Conservative meeting, presided over by Dr. A.A. (Gus) Macdonald, former M.L.A., the guest speaker was Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean, the candidate in Queens County. He stressed the provision of large subsidies for dragger construction, and blasted as false the Liberal contention that the PC government would take away from fishermen their unemployment insurance benefits.

He emphasized that this never was and never would be Conservative policy and reminded his audience that it was the Diefenbaker government that first paid unemployment benefits to fishermen.

The Kings County PC candidate, Mrs. Margaret Macdonald stated that more than \$2,300,000 had been spent in Kings County in improving fishing facilities and ports since the Conservative took office and many more improvements are planned.
