MARSHAL BARRINE is dying in Madrid.

THE Moncton Times is in receipt of potato bugs discovered near Shediac.

A NEW gold discovery is reported at Gold River, Lunenburg county, N. S.

THE race for the harbor championship of Halifax takes place on August 7th.

ONE common drunkard was sentenced to one month's imprisonment by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon.

SARAH BERNHARDT spends \$20,000 on her outfit for her American venture and expects to realize \$100,000 by it.

SEVEN hundred dollars were realised by the tea party at Cardigan Bridge, on Monday last.

IT is said that recent rains have done much damage by flooding in England, Ireland, Spain and Germany.

THIRTEEN thousand five hundred registered letters passed through the Charlottetown Post Office since the first of January last.

THE Galvane arrived via Pictou to-day. She will remain until Monday, when she will sail direct to Labrador to resume her work.

A NEW YORK despatch says the gradual increase in Dr. Tanner's weight is beginning to arouse the suspicions of the general public.

THE Government have determined to enforce the use of continuous brakes on passenger trains on English railways after the 1st of August.

THE persons who live in the vicinity of Mount Edward Cemetery and are in the habit of desecrating the graves therein, are known, and will be prosecuted if they do so again.

ACCIDENTS.—Mr. John Davies, of the "Rankin," received severe injuries by accidentally falling from a coach before his hotel, yesterday. Mr. Edmund Swabey also fell from a horse on his farm yesterday, and received painful injuries to his body and legs. Both had very narrow escapes from death.

WE direct attention of the City Surveyor to the dangerous state of Queen street. It is largely strewn with small sharp stones, which are very injurious to horses' hoofs. Could they not be raked off.

THOSE who pass the Malpeque Road a short distance beyond St. Dunstan's College are very apt to be stifled by the stench issuing from the carcasses of a horse, ass or cow, which is insufficiently buried there. It would be well for the Health Officers to see to this matter, and have it instantly removed.

THERE were a dozen applicants for the unpleasant job of execution of the murderer of Hon. George Brown. The execution, which is fixed for to-day, will be witnessed only by medical men, members of the press and necessary attendants.

A WOMAN named Mary Mooney, 50 years of age, jumped from a third story window of the St. Vincent's Convent, St. John, N. B., on Wednesday last, and split her skull open. She was temporarily insane, and had been connected with the house for 26 years.

KILLED.—George Drent, a section-man on the New Brunswick Railway, was instantly killed at Hartland, N. B., on Wednesday. He and three others were engaged in lowering wire recently put for ferry purposes; they were unable to control the winch with which they were working; the cranks flew around and struck him on the head, crushing his skull.

SUMMER TRAVEL.—Over 400 guests were registered at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, on Monday. Between two and three hundred persons registered at nine of the hotels in St. John on Tuesday, many of whom were American tourists. About 40 persons, several of whom were Americans, registered at the Weldon House in this town on Tuesday.—Moncton Times.

A REPORT comes from Kentville, N. S., that an old man named Criss was lost in the woods near New Ross, on the road from Kentville to Chester, and was entirely without food for seven days. When found he was on the verge of death. Another man named Criss heard his cries but did not go to see whence they proceeded.

THE MONTREAL HORSE TRADE.—The Gazette says that the total number of horses shipped from Montreal during the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1880, was 8,267 head, costing \$670,657.89, as compared with the year previous ending June 30th, 1879, of 6,632 horses, costing \$491,435.90, showing an increase in horses of 1,635 head and in value \$179,421.99. The average price paid during the past year was \$81 per head, against \$74 the year previous.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, July 21.

Parnell, as president of the Home Rule Confederation of Great Britain, has issued a circular to all Home Rule organizations, summoning them to appoint delegates for a convention at Newcastle-on-Tyne on the 9th of August, and stating that it is of the utmost importance now that attention be directed to Ireland, and that Irishmen in Great Britain should show that they are not slackening in their advocacy of Irish rights.

The Irish relief bill was read a third time and passed last night.

NEW YORK, July 21.

Washington specials and late despatches received from Minister Fairchild remove all doubt as to American vessels being fired on by Spanish naval vessels. The Spanish authorities, while disavowing the act, claim that they have the right to fire upon suspicious vessels, whether carrying the American flag or not, within two marine leagues of the Cuban shores.

JERSEY CITY, July 21.

This morning the caisson surrounding the deep well leading to the entrance of the Hudson River Tunnel, at the foot of 16th street, this city, caved in, carrying an immense quantity of earth. Twenty-one men were buried and seven taken out alive; fourteen remained underneath. The water from the river flowed in rapidly, and a steam fire engine set to work to, if possible, save those who might be alive from drowning. The workmen resided in the vicinity of the tunnel, and a large and excited crowd is congregated.

LATER.

NEW YORK, July 21.

Twenty-two men lost their lives in the Hudson River Tunnel, while eight escaped. The depth of the shaft is 65 feet. While the most of the men were employed at the bottom of the shaft about thirty were engaged on the brick wall of the arch 25 feet higher. It was the latter squad, who were bricklayers, that escaped except two. The main arch of the tunnel runs out from the shaft 30 feet when it opens into two distinct arches that are to form the tunnel. Through some negligence of the men, it is supposed, the air-lock was not properly adjusted when the process of shifting commenced. The brick wall connecting the two arches gave way, and the water rushed into the cave. There are 100 men at work to dig out a new passage to the tunnel.

NEW YORK, July 31.

At a meeting of the Democratic State Committee to-day, a Committee was appointed to encourage naturalization, and to the protection of naturalized voters. A resolution was adopted urging harmony in the party.

The State department has information that the vessel which recently fired upon the two American schooners in Cuban waters was the Cauto, a small screw steamer of the Spanish Navy. No formal presentation of the case will be made to the Spanish Government until the report of Admiral Wymany, who was yesterday ordered with the Tennessee to Havana, has been received.

NEW YORK, July 21.

Catherine Gordon was sent to the penitentiary to-day for forcing whiskey down the throat of her six year old daughter, then stuffing the child's mouth with snuff because it cried, and finally beating it with the fire shovel so badly that physicians predict its death from fracture of the skull.

LONDON, July 21.

Earl Dalhousie is dead. His son Lord Ramsay, member of Parliament for Liverpool, succeeds him to the peerage.

BERLIN, July 20.

Negotiations with Rome have been virtually broken off.

The social democrats, Fritche and Hasselmann, members of the Reichstag, have been tried and acquitted on a charge of remaining here during the session of Reichstag, while under a sentence of exile from the city.

CAPE TOWN, July 21.

Official news from Beusotoland is unsatisfactory. The loyal natives are attacked in all directions and massacres are threatened. The government has ordered three troops of mounted rifles to the support of the British agent.

Mr. Garfield and the Chinese.

Mr. Garfield, in his published letter, formally accepting the nomination of the Republican party as candidate for the Presidency, takes strong grounds against the Chinese. He says: "The recent movement of the Chinese to our Pacific coast partakes but little of the qualities of such emigration either in its purposes or its result. It is too much like an importation to be welcomed without restriction; too much like an invasion to be looked upon without solicitude. We cannot consent to allow any form of servile labor to be introduced among us under the guise of immigration. Recognizing the gravity of this subject the present Administration, supported by Congress, has sent to China a commission of distinguished citizens for the purpose of securing such a modification of the existing treaty as will prevent the evils likely to arise from the present situation. It is confidently believed that these diplomatic negotiations will be successful without the loss of commercial intercourse between the two Powers, which promises a great increase of reciprocal trade and the enlargement of our markets. Should these efforts fail, it will be the duty of Congress to mitigate the evils already felt, and prevent their increase by such restrictions as, without violence or injustice, will place upon a sure foundation the peace of our communities and the freedom and dignity of labor."

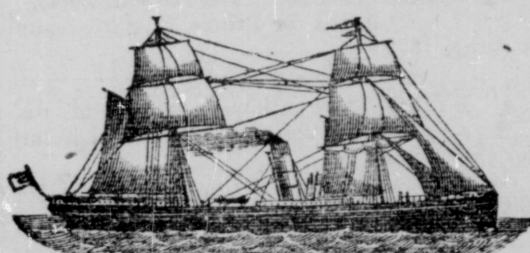

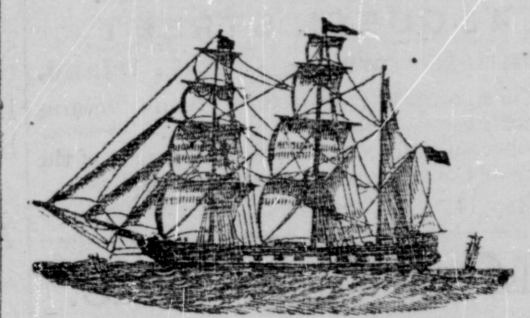
