Alberton Family To Visit Europe

ALBERTON — Dr. and Mrs. S. Hellmich, with their daughter Krystyna and son Mark, left Alberton Monday morning for New York from where they will sail on the "Leonardo Da Vinci" to being a tour of southern Europe and the near east which will continue for more than two months.

After disembarking at Naples, they will tour Rome, Florence, Venice, and Genoa in Italy. From Genoa they will sail on the "M. V. Lydia" to visit Piraeus and Athens in Greece.

The next lap of the journey will take them to Alexandria and Cairo in Egypt, to Beirut in Lebanon, to Jordan and Israel where they will visit many of the places sacred to all Christians: Rachel's Tomb, The Wall, Pilate's Judgment Hall, The Via Dolorosa, The Church of The Holy Sepulchre, and The Place of the Ascension, etc.

\$8 Million Sought After Ship Crash

NEW YORK (Reuters)—The Alva Steamship Co. Ltd. and the Navigation and Coal Trade Co. Ltd., both British firms, were among five corporations sued Monday for a total of \$8,000,000

in claims brought by 28 crew members of the tanker Texaco Massachusetts.

The suits arise from the June 16 collision of the British tanker Alva Cape and the American tanker Texaco Massachusetts in New York harbor. Thirty-one persons died in the collision.

The civil suits, each claiming \$250,000 for personal injury, were filed in U.S. district court by the crew members, all of whom were in U.S. district court by the crew members, all U.S. citizens.

In identical suits, the seamen charged the defendants with negligence and claimed that the collision was due to the "unseaworthiness of each of the respective vessels and tugs."

In addition to the two British firms, the suits named as defendants Texaco Incorp., Domestic Transport Incorp., and Humble Oil and Refining Co.
