## Tignish Planning Closed Ice Rink Next Year

TIGNISH — Proposed plans for the erection of a closed ice rink were announced at the April meeting of the Sport Recreation Association of Tignish. John Gavin, vice-president of the rink committee, reported that despite the shortness of the past season due to mild weather, activities at the outdoor rink had proved very satisfactory. More than 400 children were provided with a full program of ice activities, he stated.

Mr. Gavin expressed thanks to Robert Keough, who took on the difficult task of ice-making, and to Alcide Boudreault and Reg Elderstau for the building maintenance.

Others to receive thanks from Mr. Gavin were the Tignish Co-op Fisheries Ltd., village commissioners, coaches, referees, canteen helpers and the many persons who donated the use of their cars to the young skaters and hockey players.

President David Harper brought up the subject of the importance of little league baseball, pointing out that there are a large number of enthusiastic youngsters eager to form teams.

Wilson Shea, manager of the Tignish Co-op Fisheries complimented all those who participated in the winter's program and urged that more parents attend the meetings of the association and give added help in promoting sporting activities in the district.

Several comments were heard from non-members of the association, regarding the success and satisfaction derived from the organization, in the provision of good clean sports, something that has been badly needed in the area for some time.

The association was said to be living up well to its motto, "to help the youth of the community to become better citizens" and it was hoped that the association would continue its work along this line.

## Liberal Leader And Wife Will Open Campaign Here

Mrs. Lester B. Pearson will accompany her husband when he arrives in Charlottetown next Wednesday to open the Liberal party's national campaign for the election to be held June 18. The wife of the Liberal leader will be entertained at an afternoon tea and reception held in her honor at the Charlottetown Hotel Wednesday from 3 to 5 o'clock by the Charlottetown Women's Liberal Club.

Mr. and Mrs. Pearson and party are scheduled to arrive at Charlottetown by chartered plane from Ottawa, and to leave for Newfoundland at 8.30 a.m. Thursday. In between he is to address a major meeting in Charlottetown and other gatherings in Morell and Murray River, visit the Confederation Chamber and Montague Hospital, and hold a dinner meeting with the province's four Liberal candidates.

WECOMING PARTY

Mr. Pearson is to be met at the airport by the four candidates, Allison Gillis and Ira Lewis, for Queens; J. George MacKay, for Prince, and Thomas J. Kichham, for Kings, along with other key figures in the party, including E.D. Reid, president of the P.E.I. Liberal. The same group will make up the dinner party at the Charlottetown Hotel, at 1 p.m. Travelling with Mr. Pearson will be Hon. J. W. Pickersgill and Senator John Connolly, president of the National Liberal Federation.

The party is to leave for Morell at 1.15 p.m., with a meeting scheduled there at 2.45 p.m. at the Memorial Hall. Aldus MacKenzie, president of Second Kings Liberals, is to preside.

At Murray River, the meeting is to be held at the Mayfair Theatre at 4.15 p.m. with Dr. Lorne Bonnell, acting Liberal leader in the province presiding.

TO VISIT MATHESON

Upon returning to Charlottetown, Mr. Pearson is to visit Alex W. Matheson, Q.C., provincial Liberal leader and former premier, who is at present a patient at the P.E.I. Hospital.

It has been indicated that the Charlottetown meeting, at 8 p.m. at the Queen Charlotte High School auditorium, will include important policy pronouncements, since it marks the official opening of Mr. Pearson's national campaign.

Also speaking at this meeting will be Mr. Pickersgill, Sen. Connolly, and the province's four Liberal candidates. Mr. Reid will preside.

## Seal Hunters Will Meet

Within a few weeks persons interested in sealing will be brought together to discuss plans for a more effective program of seal hunting.

The meeting will be called by the provincial department of fisheries in an effort to bring about a thoroughly organized hunting operation.

Officials point out that proper planning could make seal hunting more effective and at the same time remove some of the dangers in future years. They say that if hunters are willing to co-operate, a boat could be located near the seal field and then by using helicopters the maximum effort could be made. Under consideration is the use of a boat owned and operated by Reginald MacDonald of Souris.

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## Half-Million Development Planned For National Park

OTTAWA (Special) A construction and development program amounting to half a million dollars has been announced for the Prince Edward National Park.

Making the announcement, Hon. J. Angus MacLean and Heath Macquarrie, MPs for Queens, said the funds for the program are provided in the 1962-63 estimates of the department of Northern Affairs and National Resources.

Development will continue on the New London (Cavendish) and Stanhope camp grounds and a semi-service camp will be started on Rustico (Robinson Island). Throughout the park, camp ground and picnic facilities will be improved.

The allocated amount covers general operation and maintenance costs, the cost of new park equipment and winter works projects in progress during April and May.

All the work is part of regular development program of the national parks branch and is planned to accommodate an increasing number of campers and visitors.

## Golf Playoff Slated Today To Break Tie

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Three young newcomers—Jack Nicklaus, Bobby Nichols, and Dan Sikes—missed birdie putts on the final green Sunday for a three-way tie for first place in the \$50,000 Houston Golf Classic.

The classic's fourth playoff in as many years—a PGA record—will begin at 2 p.m. EST today. The winner will receive \$9,000, second man \$4,500 and third man \$3,000.

The final putts of Nicklaus and Nichols, playing in the last threesome, stopped on the lip of the cup. Sikes saw his shot stop a foot short.

Nicklaus, the 1961 national amateur champion seeking his first championship as a pro, entered the final round with a two-stroke lead over Nichols and four strokes ahead of Sikes.

Nicklaus jumped to a two-over-par 72 for the 7,100-yard Memorial Park Course and earlier rounds of 68, 70, and 68 gave him a 72-hole 287—two under par. Nichols, winner of the recent St. Petersburg Open, had 68-69-71-70 and Sikes had 71-68-71-68—278.

Catholic Cathedral, St. Thomas Episcopal (Anglican) Church, Fifth Avenue Presbyterian and St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church—all within a few blocks of the parade site.

The solemnity of the Christian occasion even left its mark in Communist China, where reports from the New China news agency in Tokyo said church services were conducted and chocolate Easter eggs were sold.

The holy city of Jerusalem, thronged with pilgrims from distant lands, hailed the resurrection of Christ with joyous hymns and pealing of church bells.

## New Ruling Is Applied

QUEBEC (CP) — Reacting to Benny (Kid) Paret's ring death, Canadian boxing authorities announced Saturday that an electro-encephalograph examination will be required in future before a boxer who has been knocked out may fight again in Canada.

Commissioner Gene Letourneau of the Canadian Boxing Federation applied the new ruling immediately in announcing that middleweight Rejean Robert of Trois-Rivieres, Que., must take six months rest and the brain test before fighting again.

Robert has been knocked out several times recently.

"If the Cuban boxer had received an electro-encephalograph test after the beating he took from Gene Fullmer, the unhappy accident might not have occurred," said Letourneau.

Paret died 10 days after losing his welterweight title on a knockout by Emil Griffith. Earlier, Paret was badly beaten in a middleweight title fight with Fullmer.
