KILLED ON THE SHORE LINE.—Thomas Hagan, aged 22, a native of Kelly's Cross, Lot 29, P. E. Island, where his parents reside, and who has been working on the Shore Line Railroad for some four and a half months, was killed on Monday evening, at Reed's Pond, sixteen miles from Bangor, while at work on the line. Hagan and another man named Wm. Lovely, were digging in a cut when the mass of earth overhead gave way and dropped down suddenly. Lovely jumped back and escaped, but Hagan was buried beneath the debris. About ten minutes elapsed before those who came to the rescue were able to release their comrade and then he was a lifeless corpse. At a cost of about one-half to three-fourths of a cent boiling water, warm food or hot drinks can be had at any time during the night, in from two to four minutes after lighting the gas, thus making the stove useful in the nursery and sick room, both summer and winter.
