A NEW PARTY.

REPRESENTATIVES of laboring men in the Upper Provinces recently met in Toronto and organized a new political party to be called "The Independent Labor Party of Canada." As the name suggests, the principal object of the proposed party is to advance the interests of the laboring classes. The Independent Labor Party of Canada, which is intended to a certain extent to take the place of the Patrons of Industry, will not confine its membership, as that defunct organization did, to the laboring and farming classes alone, but will admit any worthy person, regardless of position or rank, provided he is independent in his political views. It is announced that the prime object of the new party will be to champion the cause of labor. Laboring men—who it is claimed are far from being in sympathy with either one of the present political organizations—are to be thoroughly organized with the understanding that the new party is principally for their benefit. The formation of this new party is significant of disappointment and dissatisfaction with Liberal rule.

ANTI-JAPANESE LEGISLATION.

THOSE who trouble British Columbia at the present time have learned that their powers are limited and that they will not be permitted to make laws involving international complications. The imperial government have asked the Canadian Government to disallow the anti-Japanese legislation of British Columbia, if the province will not agree to amend the law at the next meeting of the Provincial legislature. It is the objectionable character of the act which is regarded as an insult upon its people, that Japan complains of and not to any other effect it may have against them. Japan is a friendly ally of Great Britain and it is held by the Imperial Government that in the interests of Canada and Britain alike this friendship ought to be maintained in the Orient, more especially when the object sought for can be attained in another way. It is understood that the Dominion Government have communicated with the British Columbia government to see if they will suggest any remedy in the matter, and that the British Columbia government have notified the Dominion authorities that they will not amend their anti-Japanese Legislation. In this event the legislature will be disallowed. But it is possible that Mr. Chamberlain's suggestion of the passage by the Dominion Parliament of an act similar to the Natal Act, protecting British Columbia from the inroads of the Japanese, will be adopted.

—The arrangement of the difficulties between the Grand Trunk Railway Company and its striking employes is attributed, for the most part, to three Conservative members of Parliament, viz: E. F. Clarke, E. A. Powell and George Taylor. As a result of the good offices of these gentlemen the leaders of the conflict were brought together and arrangements were made for a friendly settlement of the matter. Conservatives usually come to the front when practical work is to be done.

—The British garrison in Halifax is in commotion on account of a recent order forbidding the soldiers to curl their front hair over their foreheads or carry one glove in their hand instead of on it. The Herald reports that a hundred and twenty-five men have been thrown into prison on account of their refusal to obey the obnoxious order.

THE DREYFUS CASE.

"The mills of the god grind slowly, but they grind exceeding sure." In 1894, Captain Dreyfus was unjustly condemned, evidence on his behalf being refused and his protestations of innocence being ignored. But in spite of the power of the army of France, in spite of popular prejudice against the Jewish race to which Captain Dreyfus belongs, in spite of a contemptible Government disposed to pander to both the army and the populace, Captain Dreyfus has at length been vindicated and restored to his position and rank, while those who intrigued and committed forgeries against him have been brought to confusion, some of them to violent death. The Dreyfus case verifies the saying that "truth crushed to the earth will rise again."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—It is evident, now, that the Government of this Province will not be financially relieved by the Dominion Government. That hope must be given up; and another Liberal election cry invented.

—Mr. C. Bruce McDougall has been appointed to one of the railway offices at Moncton. The Liberal government provides liberally for its newspaper friends. During the late local election campaign in New Brunswick, McDougall was publicly charged by ex-Mayor Cole, of Moncton, with having secured men to personate certain absent voters. The Journal remarks that such a man is worthy of a fat job under Liberal rule.

—Papers in the Upper Provinces have noted the gross injustice of the Liberal gerrymander in respect to P. E. Island. The Montreal Gazette remarks that by the present arrangement of the P. E. I. constituencies there is only a difference of 1,741 between the most populous. By the proposed Laurier arrangement there will be eight thousand more people represented by the member for Kings than by one of the members for Prince. Toronto is not the only place that is being robbed to make the Liberal majority sure.

—In connection with the criticism of its contention that one member of Parliament is enough for each 50,000 people in the city of Toronto, while the average contains less than 26,000, the Ottawa Free Press says there are special reasons why the 50,000 people in its own city should have two members. It would be interesting to learn why the political influence of one man in Ottawa should be equal to that of two in Toronto, as well as why Prince County in this Province should have two representatives in the House of Commons and King's County only one? Perhaps The Patriot or The Guardian or The Pioneer will answer these questions.

MONUMENT TO SIR JOHN

Unveiled at Toronto Yesterday—Letter from Senator Ferguson.

A splendid monument to the memory of Sir John Macdonald was unveiled at Toronto yesterday with appropriate ceremonies. A number of leading Liberal Conservatives delivered speeches on the occasion. Senator Ferguson of this Province was invited to be present and deliver an address; but he was unable to comply with the invitation. His letter to the Secretary of the Liberal Conservative Club of Toronto speaks for himself.

OTTAWA, June 3rd, 1899.

E. M. Dumas, Esq., President Liberal Conservative Club, Toronto.

DEAR SIR,—I duly received your very kind invitation to be present at the unveiling of the monument to the memory of Sir John Macdonald, in your city on Tuesday next, and greatly regret that I am prevented by the illness of a member of my family from paying, in person, my tribute of respect and veneration to the father of our country. The great Chief whose memory is about being suitably honored in the Queen City of Ontario, was, in no part of Canada, more sincerely beloved than in the Province of Prince Edward Island, for which in act and word he never failed to show a most kindly feeling.

Under the blessing God, the bracing climate of the "Garden of the Gulf" wrought a complete restoration of the great statesman's health when, in 1866, he sought its shores borne down by illness and overwork. The quarter of a century of his subsequent life, devoted to nation building, were years in which Prince Edward Island justly claims a peculiar interest, and the hearts of thousands of its people beat in unison with those of their fellow Canadians, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, in love of memory of one of the greatest men of the present century.
