

Rookie Joe Namath Sparks Stars To Win

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—New York Jets' Joe Namath, the only rookie on the team, engineered a non-stop second-half drive that produced 24 points and gave the American Football League All-Stars a 30-19 victory over the AFL champion Buffalo Bills Saturday.

The game, which attracted a record 35,572 fans, revolved around the 22-year-old Namath from the moment he replaced San Diego Chiefs' John Hadl at the beginning of the second half with the All-Stars trailing 13-4. Namath passed for two touchdowns, hitting Lance Alworth 43 and 10-yard tosses that gave the ace San Diego receiver an All-Star record of being the first to catch a pair of touchdowns passes.

While Namath was engineering the touchdown drives, the All-Star defence held the Bills in check, particularly during the third quarter when Buffalo never was able to get beyond its 46-yard line.

TRADED DURING GAME

Defensive line standouts for the All-Stars were San Diego tackle Earl Falsone and rookie Ladd, who played without knowing that a trade had been announced in the press box. They were sent to Houston Oilers Saturday in exchange for linebacker Johnny Baker, defensive end Gary Cutajner and cornerback Pete Jacques.

The All-Stars got their first break in the second half when Dave Grayson intercepted a pass by Jack Kemp on the 40 and Gino Cappellotti kicked a field goal from the 32—his third

of the game and an All-Star record.

On that short drive Namath felt out the Bills by using San Diego's Paul Lowe and Keith Lincoln on smashes into the line. Then he went to the air. A 14-yard pass to Lincoln took the ball to the Buffalo 38. Lowe gained most of the remaining ground in the drive and eventually cracked over from the one for a 16-13 All-Star lead.

The All-Stars got the ball back almost immediately when San Diego's linebacker Frank Buncom intercepted another Kemp toss at the Buffalo 43. Namath sent Lowe into the line for no gain, then arched a long one to Alworth, who caught it over his shoulder while outracing Butch Byrd.

Two plays after the kickoff Boston's Nick Buoniconti picked off a Kemp pass and the All-Stars moved toward the Buffalo goal again. Namath used Denver Broncos' Cookie Gilchrist and Houston's Ode Burrell effectively on rushes into the line, then hit Alworth with a 10-yarder for a touchdown when the going got rough.

Namath, who completed six of 10 passes for 89 yards, was voted the game's outstanding offensive player. Alworth came second. Buncom was named the outstanding defensive player.

Buffalo was able to cross the goal only once again and that came on the Bills' only drive into All-Star territory in the final half. Kemp's substitute, Daryle Lamonica, hit Wrap Carlton with a 34-yard touchdown pass with just 34 seconds left.

Saints' Varsity Pucksters Trip Stubborn Tommies

FREDERICTON — St. Dunstan's University Saints returned home yesterday after splitting a gruelling two game road trip against St. Thomas and UNB Red Devils. The trip produced only partial success, but to coach Jack Kane, the remaining schedule gives room for optimism. It goes as follows:

With three games last week in five nights the Saints dropped two, to St. F.X. at home, 9-1, and to UNB Friday, 5-3, but ended up on a strong note with a convincing 4-2 victory against the spirited but weaker St. Thomas University Tommies.

The weekend split leaves the Saints record at three wins and three losses, with eight games remaining in the schedule; four are at home, and four on the road. Only once, Feb. 5 and 6, do they play double weekend games.

The Saints don't play again until a week tonight against Université de Moncton, at Moncton. Their next home game is during the Winter Carnival, Jan. 29 against Acadia Axemen.

Saturday night, the Saints rebounded to the 5-3 loss to UNB with a good strong team effort to beat St. Thomas 4-2. They were never in real trouble, although the hustling Tommies, led by captain Paul Oletic and shift winger Bill Daley, scored two goals in the third period and gave goalie Carl McQuaid some tough moments in a late surge.

For St. Dunstan's Maurice Roy, Mike Kelly, Rick O'Donnell, and Dick Flynn collected singles, while Bill Daley potted a pair for the Tommies, both from close in.

Both goalies, Carl McQuaid for St. Dunstan's and Bob Bowers for St. Thomas, performed brilliantly, each making spectacular saves on breakaway efforts. In the first period, for example, Maurice Roy broke in alone on Bowers, faked to the side, and tried to slide the puck to the

corner. Bowers held his ground and smothered the puck for a whistle. In the third, Paul Oletic caught the SDU defense napping and broke in unopposed, but McQuaid saved with a neat stick manoeuvre to foil his effort.

St. Dunstan's led 1-0 after the first, added three in the second, and were out scored 2-0 in the third. However, the Saints led in the final period was less a case of being outplayed as poor shooting and bad luck around the St. Thomas net. Mike Kelly, Gordie Whitlock, Glen Hughes, and Maurice Roy all missed glorious scoring opportunities, especially by shooting wide of the net.

He has eight goals for the season, tops on the club.

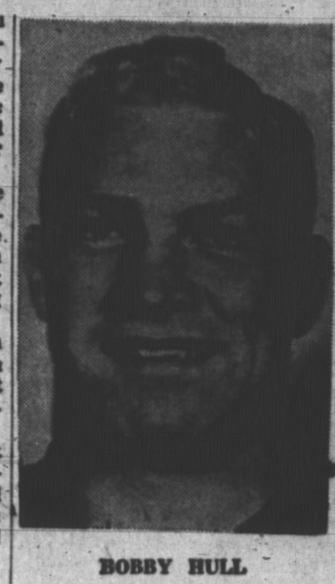
Habs, Red Wings Triumph; Hull's 4 Goals Not Enough

BOSTON (CP)—Jean Beliveau scored the 37th goal of his National Hockey League career Sunday night, giving him a tie for fourth place in the all-time scoring race, to help Montreal Canadiens to a 3-1 victory over Boston Bruins.

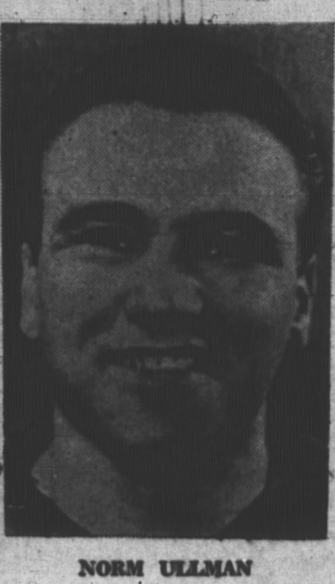
Beliveau's goal at 12:14 of the second period gave the Canadiens a 2-1 lead, putting the game out of reach of Boston and keeping the Canadiens hot on the trail of league-leading Chicago.

Beliveau now is tied with Montreal's Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffroy, just eight goals behind Detroit's Ted Lindsay, who scored 379 goals.

The cellar-dwelling Bruins got a one-goal jump on the Canadiens before the sellout crowd was settled as Pit Martin banged in a second rebound after 19 seconds of play.

Henri Richard also scored for the Canadiens, after Claude Provost intercepted a clearing pass in the Boston end. That set the stage for Beliveau.

Montreal appeared to have another second period goal when Jacques Laperriere shot hit the pipes of the Boston goal behind goaltender Ed Johnston but goal judge Benmie Bertini did not allow it.

in the opening minute. Hodge couldn't be faulted for the Boston goal.

Ron Stewart took the opening faceoff and passed to Bob Dillabough, whose shot from the left side was knocked aside by Hodge. Martin banged the initial rebound off the boards behind the cage but the puck bounced back onto his stick.

Brown Leads Easterners To Convincing 36-7 Win

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Fullback Jim Brown scored a record-tying three touchdowns, Jim Bakken booted three field goals and quarterback Frank Ryan steered the East to a 36-7 victory over the West in the National Football League's Pro Bowl game Sunday.

It was a case of either the West playing give-away football or take-away by the East as 60,124 fans watched in astonishment as the error-plagued West set records in reverse.

The West had eight passes intercepted, six of them (a game record) thrown by water-back John Brodie of San Francisco '49ers. Otto Graham held the old record, five in the 1953 Pro Bowl game.

LED FROM START

The East, a seven-point underdog, got off to a 10-point lead in the first quarter, at the half led 23-0 and built it to 36-0 before the West got on the scoreboard in the final four minutes.

A 51-yard pass by Brodie, a spectacular leaping catch by Tommy McDonald of Los Angeles Rams produced the touchdown.

It averted what would have been the first shutout in the post-season game between the stars of the Eastern and Western Conferences of the NFL.

It was the first victory by the East since 1962 and it now has won six against 10 for the West.

WIN AWARDS

Brown's touchdown yardage totalled five yards as he smashed over from the two twice and from the one the other time. But he was the busiest back on the field as he voted top back in the game for the third time. St. Louis Cardinals' linebacker Dale Meiner, a former player with Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Conference, was named the top lineman in the game.

RANGERS 6 CHICAGO 5

CHICAGO (AP)—New York Rangers hung on to beat Chicago Black Hawks 6-5 Sunday night in National Hockey League action, despite a four-goal performance by Bobby Hull.

Three of Hull's goals came in the final period, while the Hawks battled to overcome a 5-2 edge the Rangers held at the end of the second period.

The defeat, their second in a row, dropped the Hawks into a first place tie in the National Hockey League with Montreal Canadiens, who defeated Boston 3-1 Sunday night.

Hull's four goals boosted his league-leading scoring total to 50 points on 36 goals and 23 assists. Hull now has scored three goals or more in a game four times this year and 17 times in regular season play in his nine-year NHL career. He has 33 games to play this year and now is 14 goals shy of the single season record.

He also has scored four goals four times in his career. His fourth Sunday tied his career total to 300, making him only the eighth player in league history and at 27, the youngest ever, to score 300 goals in a career.
