**FRENCH MEAT ROLL**  
Oven Temperature 425°

**TEA-BISK CRUST**  
2 cups MONARCH Tea-Bisk  
1 teaspoon parsley flakes

**MEAT FILLING**—Combine and mix well together—  
1 lb. minced beef  
½ cup chopped celery  
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper  
¼ cup chopped onion  
1 teaspoon parsley flakes  
½ teaspoon dry mustard

1 teaspoon dry mustard  
½ cup less 2 tablespoons water

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
2 unbeaten eggs  
¼ cup catsup  
¼ cup fine PURITY Rolled Oats or bread crumbs  
1 teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon pepper
