**Local and Other Items.**

D. BANKS MCKENZIE has returned to St. John, after holding many successful Reform meetings in Windsor N. S.

THE Dominion Government has issued orders to enforce the coasting regulations regarding American vessels.

THE steamship Teutonia, from Liverpool for New Orleans, was anchored off Somtomer, on Sunday night, with her propeller damaged.

Eleven lives were lost by the burning of the steamer Lotus, at Waterloo, on last Saturday. All the deck hands and passengers were saved.

A YARMOUTH, N. S., ship—the Oasis—of 1,150 tons, collided with an English steamer off Hollyhead, on the 29th ult., and immediately sank. The crew were saved.

EIGHT of the principal business houses and two dwellings were burned recently at Athens, Ohio, at midnight. The loss is estimated at from \$60,000 to \$80,000.

COUNTERFEIT NOTES.—Five hundred dollars in counterfeit "tens," on the Ontario Bank, have been discovered in Montreal within the past few days.

SMALL DEBT COURT.—The cases before the Small Debt Court are not yet half completed. The cases of defaulters to the city are troublesome, and take up a great deal of the time of the Court.

THE GREAT CASH SALE of Messrs. Geo. Davies & Co. is drawing immensely. The LONDON HOUSE is the chief point of attraction for town and country; and the talk is that prices never were so low.

THE returns from the Antigonish, N. S., County elections, so far, show the McDonald, in all the electoral districts heard from, only received four votes.

WE are in receipt of *Belford's Monthly* for December. It is, as usual, well filled with excellent contributions from the pens of our Canadian and American writers. It is the first number for 1878, Vol. 3.

STARVATION DOWN EAST.—A gentleman just returned from Sheet Harbor says the people along the Eastern Shore of Nova Scotia are suffering greatly from want of necessities of life; and many of them are actually in a state of starvation.—*Hx. Reporter.*

THE Dominion steam Dredge *St. Lawrence*, on her way from Halifax to St. John, struck a rock off the West Head of Gape Island and was towed into Barrington, badly injured. It is said that the rock on which she struck was hitherto unknown.

NAVIGATION on the *St. Lawrence* may now be called virtually closed. The port of Montreal is now clear of shipping with the exception of a few barges and river craft, which will soon seek winter quarters. The last steamer of the Richelieu Company left for Quebec on last Tuesday, sheds are being taken down, and everything in the neighborhood is assuming a wintry appearance.—*Monetary Times.*

WINDFALLS.—A gentleman belonging to St. Stephen, N. B., is reported to have fallen heir to the fifth part of \$400,000. Bashfulness at owning so much wealth induces him to keep his name a secret for the present.—John Holmes, formerly member for Carleton, Ont., has fallen heir to a fortune of one million dollars, by the death of his brother in New Zealand.

THE Quebec Chronicle puts the issue in this delightful way:—

"Much as we respect Mr. Tourangeau, we cannot blind ourselves to the fact that Quebec has greater need for a representative sufficiently potential by his position and character to advantage it than of one who, of necessity, will be absolutely impotent to that end. The duty of the hour therefore is plain, and all who seek the interest of the ancient capital will accordingly lend their assistance to-morrow to strengthen at Ottawa the hands of the man who is obviously the *sine qua non* of the situation."

**WAR NEWS.**

**Another Turkish Success**

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

NEW YORK, Dec. 6th. Gold 102½. Exchange unchanged.

LONDON, Dec. 5. It is reported that an engagement took place on the 4th at Ahoemedli, in which the Turks were successful in their attack. The battle is still progressing.

Suliman Pasha captured Elma with eleven guns, twenty wagon loads of ammunition, and three hundred prisoners. The Russian loss was three thousand killed and wounded.

The Turks hope to capture Tirnova shortly.

Mehemet telegraphs as follows: We have advanced beyond Kamarleur, and our lines now confront the Russians, who have fallen back on Urthesh.

Bad weather prevents a general engagement.

BELGRADE, Dec. 4.

According to latest letters, public feeling in Crete favors a rising after the fall of Plevna. The Greek Government has warned the Cretans that it will stop the volunteers and supplies if they rise prematurely, or contrary to its advice.

Heavy snows in Asia have stopped all further army operations.

A special telegram from Shumla, dated Sunday night, says: "No official news has been received here since Thursday. Important movements are imminent, if not already progressing. Great anxiety prevails and many rumors are circulating, among them that heavy fighting occurred on Friday in the direction of Tirnova, upon which place the Russians were ultimately driven back, losing over 3,000 men, and that the Turks are now bombarding Tirnova. All available surgeons are going hence to Osman Bazar."

Mehemet Ali telegraphed from Kamarli, yesterday, as follows: "To-day after violently cannonading our positions at Kamarli from the heights of Etropal and Orchanie, the Russians furiously attacked our left wing. The battle lasted until evening. We retained our position, and the enemy retreated with considerable loss. Pursuit was prevented by the thickly-wooded country. We shall take the offensive to-morrow. The Russian Imperial guard was engaged in the battle."

VIENNA, Dec. 4.

A special to the *Political Correspondence* from Belgrade contains the following: "Prince Milan, addressing departing troops, dwelt upon the certain prospect of a better issue of the new campaign, which Serbia was obliged to undertake. For this time she was better armed, having a powerful ally."

The British Consul has presented a note deprecating war on the part of Serbia, showing the disloyalty of such a course and threatening the withdrawal of England's guarantee of Serbia's autonomy.

It is said that Prime Minister Riskies will leave the note unanswered.

BERLIN, Dec. 4.

The *North German Gazette* says Lord Derby's recent speech indicates that England is now resolved to abstain from intervention and not raise obstacles to peace, which may presumably be brought about under the auspices of the three Emperors. The points which Lord Derby reserves as involving British interests will not be touched by such a peace as that for which way is being paved.

THE FORGERY.—The prisoner Hubley, charged with the forgery of a promissory note of \$600 on Messrs. John D. Currie, James Currie and M. D. Harrington, was again brought before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning. The depositions of Richard Hartz, John D. Currie, James Currie and Uriah Matthews, were taken. The latter, during his evidence, produced a promissory note for six hundred dollars endorsed by the parties above named. This note was a *fac simile* of the note which Hubley sold to Mr. Hartz, and was left in Mr. Hartz's office by mistake at the time he sold the first note. He was fully committed for forgery, and will stand for trial at the Supreme Court.
