WHAT WE PAY ROCKEFELLER.

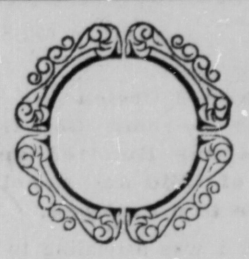

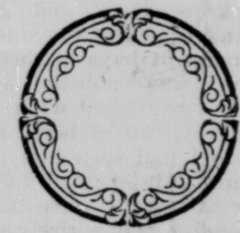
