GERMANY HELPS INDIA.

Kaizer Sends a Message and a Half Million Marks to Relieve Famine

SIMLA.

SIMLA, May 5.—Emperor William has telegraphed to the viceroy of India, Lord Curzon of Meddleston, as follows: "Full of the deepest sympathy for the terrible distress in India, Berlin has with my approval, realized the sum of over half a million marks and I have ordered it forwarded for your disposal. May India feel that this action on the part of the capital of the German empire is from a deep sense of the sympathetic love for India which has prompted my people, and which emanates from the fact that blood is richer than water."

To this message the viceroy today replied as follows:

"I have had the honor to receive your imperial majesty's most gracious telegram, the terms of which will create a thrill of gratitude throughout India for the warm-hearted, sympathetic attitude of your capital, Berlin, acting upon the opportune and noble initiative of your imperial majesty. It is indeed an illustration of the binding force of kinship of your majesty that the German people should turn with kindly thought to the work being done by the British government in this country for the relief of the terrible sufferings with which the poor Indian people are afflicted. On their behalf I venture to acknowledge the generous action of your majesty and the munificent contribution of your people."

The Lyceum Company.

An Ontario exchange says: "Seldom is it that St. Catherine's has a chance to see Shakespearean plays so that when such an opportunity is afforded as is now, the grand opera house ought to be showing the S R O sign nightly. Nobody claims that the company is composed of Henry Irving and Ellen Terry, but it is composed of an all round clever lot of people who know their lines, deliver them as though they understood them and act their parts with more than the usual ability of companies seen on the road. The performance on Tuesday night was the tragedy 'Othello, the Moor of Venice' and it could be hard to excel the performance given.

Mr. D'Oyze as the Moor, gave a capital performance that was particularly effective, especially in the chamber scene. As Iago Mr. Buffham was readily very clever, though perhaps his action was rather too much for "Honest Iago." Still he carried off the cool, smooth villain, a post master of devilish conceits, treachery and deceit, with such skill as to draw forth the hisses and applause of the audience. Miss Mamie Lorimer made a sweet Desdemona, speaking her lines with loving tenderness, and taking everything from her lord with submission. Miss Hext, as Emelie, made the most of a rather poor character and was really dramatic in the chamber scene giving a force to the character that a brave and honest woman would. The other characters were well sustained, especially Mr Clifford's Cassio.

Kipling on the Canadians.

London, May 6.—Rudyard Kipling, in the Daily Mail, referring to the disaffection of the colonies settling in South Africa and the lack of inducement offered by the home government says: "Among the various hospital, lie three hundred Canadians of every stamp and breed. We require young, clean, intelligent, well-educated men. Three hundred heads of sane and soaped families—shall we let all these beautiful men go back to their own places and never lift a finger to stay them?"

Changed in Transit.

VICTORIA, B. C. May 6.—A box from England, which, it is said, contained a wedding present of plate for Mrs. C. B. Lance, formerly Miss Wolfenden, of this city, was found on arrival a few days ago to contain nothing more valuable than a bushel of wheat. Where the transposition was effected has not yet been determined by the detectives engaged on the case.

Bear Prisoners For Ceylon.

COLOMBO, Ceylon, May 7.—It is expected that a batch of Boer prisoners will be sent here. The Imperial government has approached the Ceylon authorities on the subject and has asked them to suggest a good site for a camp.

"Canadian school children," says the Chicago Times-Herald, "have sent a message of sympathy to Aguinaldo for the purpose of offsetting American sympathy for the Boers. It will just about offset, if the messenger who has it can deliver the goods." It remains to be seen whether the other messenger will be able to deliver the goods. But it does not happen to be true that Canadian school children have sent a message to Aguinaldo!

PERSONAL.

Major Dent, of the British War Offices is now in the Upper Provinces of the Dominion purchasing horses for remounts in South Africa.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The means of telegraphic communication between this Province and Sackville are in trouble. Is this a result of Sir Louis Davies' interference? If so, it is to be regretted that Sir Louis Davies had not postponed his attack until after Lord Roberts had reached Pretoria. Instead of having better and cheaper telegraphic communication, we have—for the nonce, at an interesting juncture,—none at all!

The revenue of Egypt reached \$57,000,000 last year, which is the highest point on record. There was a surplus over expenditure of \$2,000,000, in addition to \$1,000,000 placed to the credit of the reserve fund. The government now loans money to the fellahen, or peasant class, at 10 per cent, instead of the 40 per cent. they have heretofore paid to usurers. Egypt is making great strides forward under British control.

Exclusive of those Canadians who may have fallen in the fighting in South Africa during the past week, the tale of death in the Canadian contingents is as follows:—

All the above were in the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry, except Gunner Bradley of "D" Battery, and Trooper Ramsay, of the Mounted Rifles, died of disease. Over two hundred others have been in the hospital from wounds or disease, of whom hardly half have returned to the ranks.

At the recent German military manoeuvres, four-wheeled automobiles containing an officer and driver were used for the most part, for the speedy conveyance of the elderly staff officers, and some of them ran at a speed as great as 30 or 40 miles an hour. In the Franco-Prussian war a hard day's march of twenty-four hours for transport waggons was 50 miles. At the end of each march, the horses were useless. In the recent manoeuvres motor waggons travelled at the rate of 7 miles an hour, and a day's work of ten hours was 70 miles. War authorities consider that the day is not far distant when train horses will be replaced to a considerable extent by petroleum motors. The Kaiser takes the greatest interest in this new development, and a number of officers have been set apart to study motors and impart instructions to the subordinates.

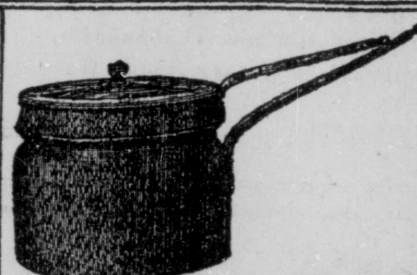
A College Representative.
