Local and Other Items.

PICTOU BOAT.—The Minto goes to Pictou tomorrow morning at 7 o'clock instead of the Princess.

NEW YEAR'S DAY.—The holiday was generally observed. There was considerably driving, and in the afternoon a good many "calls" were made.

FAILURES.—In Prince Edward Island there were this year four failures compared with three the year before and nine in 1897, the liabilities for the three years respectively being \$20,444, \$24,500 and \$110,000.—Halifax Herald.

ST. DUNSTON'S COLLEGE.—The Rector of St. Dunstan's College assures us that there is not now any diphtheria in that institution. Class work began to-day. Day scholars will not be admitted for some days, however.

RINK OPENING.—A very large number of skaters attended the opening of Hillboro Rink last evening. The ice was in excellent condition. Galbraith's band rendered good music. About nine o'clock the news of Gen. French's victory was given out by Capt. Moore when cheer upon cheer was raised. The band then played "Rule Britannia." Rather an auspicious opening.

BADLY BURNED.—A lad named Reggie Harrington, employed in J. D. Taylor's printing office, was badly burned yesterday morning. It seems that he was lighting the fire with benzine when an explosion took place. The bottom was blown out of the can and the lad's clothing took fire. Before the flames could be extinguished the boy was severely burned about the hands and neck. The little fellow had medical aid as soon as possible, and was subsequent taken to the P. E. Island Hospital. An alarm of fire was sounded, but beyond the burning of some files of job printing no damage was done.

ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The special service in St. Dunstan's Cathedral in celebration of the beginning of the closing year of the century, was attended by a congregation which filled the spacious edifice. The service was most impressive. His Lordship Bishop Macdonald celebrated Mass, assisted by Fathers Johnston and Connolly as deacon and sub-deacon, and Dr. Morrison as High Priest. His Lordship also preached, speaking very strongly regarding the evil of intemperance. At the close of His Lordship's remarks a large proportion of the congregation signified their willingness to abstain from the use of intoxicants as a beverage during the year. The musical portion of the service was under the direction of Mr. Blanchard, and some members of the League of the Cross assisted in the singing. Miss Maisie Coady assisted on the violin, and Professor Watts gave selections on the clarinet and organ. The decorations were the same as at Christmas.
