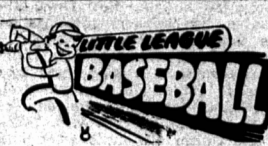
Smart Racing Meet Lined Up For Ch'town Tonight

Roy Suffers Concussion In Fight At New Glasgow

STELLARTON, N. S. (CP) — The Middleweight Gaston Roy, a St. Dunstan's University student from Charlottetown, was speeded to hospital here Monday night with head injuries after he was knocked out in the eighth round of a 10-round bout against Doug Odo of nearby Truro.

Roy, originally of Quebec City, hit the canvas three times in the eighth round when he absorbed terrific punishment at the hands of his 150-pound rival. The Frenchmen weighed in at 151.

Roy was thought to be suffering from concussion but the specific nature of his injuries would not be known until he was examined further.

The knockout came at 2:39 of the eighth round. Roy's head hit the deck with such force that it bounced. He was taken through the ranks of a milling Memorial rink in the eighth round of a 10-round bout against Doug Odo of nearby Truro.

The fight was a bruising battle from the opening bell and both fighters took a heavy beating.

In the six-round semi-final, Bob Gallant, 129, of Trenton, N.S., knocked out Buddy Day, 129, of Halifax at 1:03 of the fourth round.

Hospital authorities in New Glasgow early this morning stated that Roy was resting comfortably and that his condition was fairly good.

BROOKLYN, (AP) — Billy Cox's sacrifice fly with the bases loaded in the 13th inning snapped Milwaukee's winning streak with a 2-1 Brooklyn victory that pulled the Dodgers within five games of the idle New York Giants.

Singles by Duke Snider and Gil Hodges and an intentional pass to Sandy Amoros filled the bases for Brooklyn for the fifth time before Cox filed out to Hank Aaron, scoring Snider to end the long thriller.

The victory was the first in the majors for Pete Wojey, a rookie who pitched the last inning.

Brooklyn held a 1-0 lead from the second inning to the ninth when Milwaukee tied the score on Del Crandall's single with two out. The Dodgers failed with the bases loaded in the 12th.

Joe Adcock, Milwaukee first baseman who was "beamed" by Clem Labine in Sunday's game, was back in the starting line-up. He drew a

cheer from the crowd of 6,524 when he came up for the first time in the second inning and doubled.

The Dodgers dug into Jim Wilson for a run in the second on singles by Amoros, Jackie Robinson and Billy Loes.

PARIS, (AP) — Lean, handsome Luolson Bobet Sunday won the punishing 3,100-mile Tour de France bicycle race for the second time in a row.

A screaming mob of some 20,000 packed the Parc de Princess Stadium as the 29-year-old Bobet, who looks more like a matinee idol than an endurance cyclist, wheeled his bicycle across the finish line and then around the track to give the fans a good look at him.

Like the other 62 cyclists who finished the gruelling 23-lap race, Bobet looked drawn and exhausted. The race started a month ago in Amsterdam with laps of usually more than 100 miles each day. Forty-one racers dropped out en route.

The final lap—135 miles from Troyes to Paris—was won by Robert Varnago of France in five hours, nine minutes, 23 seconds.
