In some ways it would be at least be good to point out that we do not much enjoy the farming of now with its handier, less tiring and more profitable ways. At the same time, there was, it would seem, more satisfaction gained on the former years. In many an instance it called for more initiative to make the demands of those times.

Now so much is already "cut and dried" in every direct or by our farm-wives — in the line of foods, in wearing apparel, in the way of clearing agents, in having the water supply on tap, and heat and light in many cases at the turn of a dial on a wall, or the touch of a switch. For instance, who has time to put down in the past June, a crock or firkin of the sweetest dairy butter to be found in the winter — gold? So few. We cut now a slice from that which comes from the store or food market to the white or pastel shades of our refrigerators. We now have a refrigerator, wife, makes her husband's everyday shirts, or those for his Sabbath, stitching them with a treadle machine "between times" in her day, or at night by the light of a kerosene lamp. This query echoes hollowly!

Who nowadays bothers to make a rhythm of his life to the swamp to gather up a supply of that essential earth which once grew so gently and generally was an essential at the cleaning? No one! No, no one, the reply comes. Who has time to "take buckets" or indeed any, down a dug well these times? Or catches the chuffin of the morning while the seasons with their changes come and go? Or slices down to the sprouts for a paliff, while the vegetables cook over a woodfire, to have a good drink for her farm when she comes in to the noon idleness? Alas! The echo is a sound of the days when, what farmers were, as one fills the lamps with kerosene, trims the wicks with a burning eye, blows her breath once in a while into the chimney in their turn and pro-
