Outside the stadium the midway spun with rides of various kinds while a "crazy house" provided thrills for most, and a d'acres for the less daring. New Defence Planning Now Underway In U.K.

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain announced plans Tuesday for a new supreme defence command modelled on the United States' Pentagon and designed with U.S. advice to meet the challenge of the nuclear age.

At the top of this structure will be a new defence secretary replacing the present defence chief plus the first lord of the admiralty, the secretary of state for war and the secretary of state for air.

The new minister will carry the responsibilities for security currently layered by the three service ministers. Much of the inspiration for the unified defence command—planned to go into operation April 1, 1964—came from the organizational structure of the

Office Machine Taken In Break

SUMMERSIDE — A break at Hall Manufacturing Co. on Water Street east early Monday evening resulted in the theft of an office machine.

Entry to the building was made in daylight between 6 and 8 p.m. when the break was discovered by the president, George Key, who returned to the office.

A window in the back of the building was smashed out to permit entry by the intruders who then used implements from the machinery section of the building to break their way into the office. Summerside police are investigating the incident.

Pentagon in Washington. U.S. Defence Secretary Robert McNamara apparently was a key figure in planning Britain's version of the famous five-sided American defence headquarters.

He and British defence chief Peter Thorneycroft discussed the new organization when McNamara was here recently and had other talks at the NATO conference in Ottawa last spring.

Like the Pentagon, the new defence ministry will come under one roof, a white-walled board of trade building next to the present war office in the heart of London.

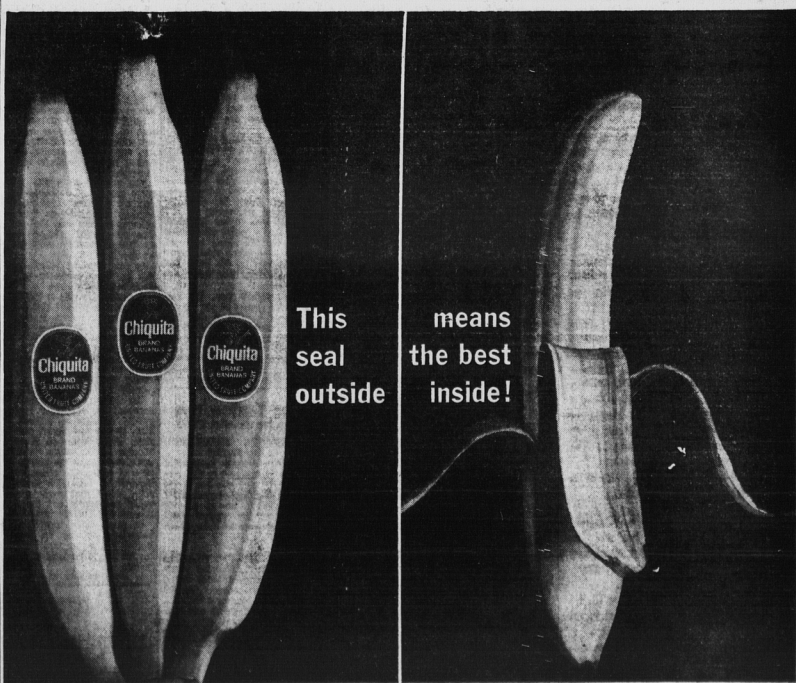
