OTTAWA (CP)—The income tax appeal board has reaffirmed that Canadians who make a business of gambling must pay income tax on their profits.

The board has rejected an appeal by Peter J. Belawski of Val d'Or, Que., against a revenue department ruling ordering him to pay tax on gambling profits amounting to \$22,000. The decision was based on previous judgments.

Mr. Belawski, operator of a cleaning and pressing business, told the board he won the money in dice and card games in 1946, 1947, 1949 and 1950. He submitted that the money should not be taxed because gambling was not his main business.

However, the board said that "even though the gambling activities of the appellant did not constitute his sole business or occupation during the years under review, nevertheless these activities amounted to the carrying on of a business the profits from which are taxable."
