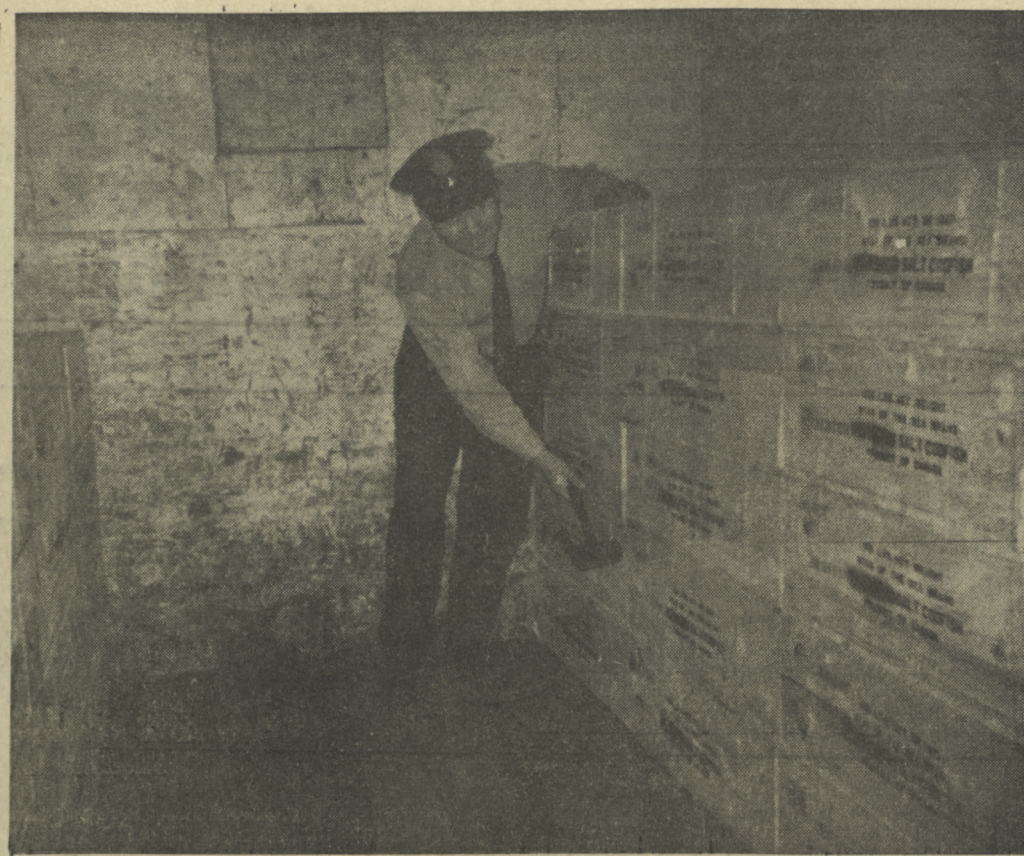

Signs Arrow Jet Project Continues A Live Issue

OTTAWA (CP)—If the Arrow is dead, it won't lie down.
The government announced last week postponement of a final decision on whether to put the super-sonic Arrow interceptor into limited production.
But it left the clear impression that the project would be scrapped, even though this might mean payment of a cancellation fee of as much as \$100,000,000 to the designer and builder, Avro

Aircraft Limited.
However, it was disclosed Wednesday that a team comprising RCAF and defence production department personnel now is in California investigating the possibility of obtaining a new flight and armament control system for the Arrow. The group is headed by Air Vice-Marshal John Easton, chief of RCAF technical services.

STUDY IN U.S.
The team left for Culver City to conduct the studies at the Hughes Aircraft Company after the government announcement concerning the Arrow and acquisition of Bomarc anti-aircraft missiles was made.
Concurrent with this announcement, the government said it was cancelling the project for development in Canada of the Astra flight and armament control system.
Prime Minister Diefenbaker said last week that though it would not be advisable "at this time" to put the Arrow into production, modifications would be made during its continuing development to permit use of an armament control system already in production in the United States.
The prime minister said the Arrow program will be continued until next March, when it would be reviewed again in light of circumstances at that time.

U.K. Troops Will Quit Jordan Soon

AMMAN (Reuters)—King Hussein Wednesday named Oct. 20 as the date Britain's 3,000 troops will start pulling out of Jordan.
In London, officials said the withdrawal could be accomplished in three weeks if the soldiers can be flown out but will take longer if they had to leave through the Jordanian port of Aqaba.

Hussein's announcement came a day after Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld of the United Nations said Britain and the United States intended to pull all their forces out of Jordan and Lebanon sometime this month.

Hussein told parliament he had faith in his army's ability to restore internal calm in Jordan. He voiced hopes for better inter-Arab relations.
But, he said, some "sister" countries "continue to make unreasonable attacks and persist in their harmful broadcasts."
The speech was interpreted as a gesture to encourage reconciliation with neighboring Arab nations.

PLEASED BY STATEMENT

Most Jordanians were pleased by Hussein's announcement that all the British troops would be out of the country as soon as transportation permitted.
But some Jordanians felt that their young ruler needed the support of British soldiers in his efforts to fight subversion from outside the country.
In his address, Hussein said it was clear that the Arab world's "mischievous, chaos and subversion" likely to occur again — was "planned by international communism, which strives to infiltrate our beloved countries."
Accordingly, he said, Jordan had been forced to seek military aid from friendly nations.
The king reported his government was trying to find money for strengthening the army and supplying it with modern weapons.

B.C. Premier Threatens Suit For Paper Story

VANCOUVER (CP)—The Vancouver Province says Premier Bennett told one of its reporters that he will sue the reporter and the newspaper for \$1,000,000 because of a Tuesday story on provincial debt reduction.
The story, from Victoria, said the premier would transfer a \$28,000,000 direct - debt item to the government - owned B.C. Power

Crusader Back In Home Port

HALIFAX (CP) — The Canadian destroyer Crusader returned to her home port here Wednesday after exercising in United Kingdom and Gibraltar waters.
The Crusader, with 220 officers and men, left here July 15. In August, she took part in the recovery of wreckage of a KLM Dutch airliner off Ireland. Last year the British-built destroyer helped search for survivors of the German sail training ship Pamir which went down in a hurricane near the Azores.
