

# O. Carver Leads Scoring

With the final scoring results of the Island Senior League tabulated, Orin Carver is the official scoring leader, with a grand total of 81 points, made up of 48 goals and 33 assists. The Parkdale centerman's total is 8 better than that of Merrill Pineau of the B.Y.C., who had 73 points on a league-leading total of 50 goals and 23 assists.

Veteran Buck Whitlock of B.Y.C. with 60 points, holds down third place, one better than Parkdale coach Alice Carver in fourth with 59 and two better than Montague coach Bubby Dowling in fifth with 58.

Whitlock's 42 assists give him a tie for the league lead with Vance Harris of Summerside Aces in that department. However, Whitlock got his total in 15 games whereas Harris was engaged in 36 games.

Trailing behind Pineau and Carver in goals is rookie Utric Gallant of Summerside Aces with 40 in 37 games. Bubby Dowling trails Gallant having scored 36 in 20 games.

Parkdale Flyers with 14 wins in 22 games finished at the top of the league with an average of .536. Aces came in second followed by B.Y.C., Montague and Saints in that order. Saints in the cellar, managed only 4 wins in 13 games.

Frank Roper retained the goal-tending title he won last year with a goals-against average of 4.39. He allowed 79 goals in 18 games. However, Barry Moore was beaten 33 times in 3 games and Sheldon Jordan missed 8 in one game, to raise the Parkdale total to 5.46. This is still the best goals-against average for teams in the league.

No other league net-minder was even close to Roper.

The Carver brothers of the Parkdale Flyers, slammed in a whopping total of 99 goals between them. This amounts to over 65 percent of the Parkdale total.

## Self-Reliance, Gay Adventure Are By-products From Sport

MONTREAL (CP)—Community interest in sport, backed by leadership and encouragement of adults and the press, is a prime necessity not only for development of sport itself but for the betterment of Canada, in the opinion of Senator Harland de M. Molson.

"We are a young country and if we are to develop it fully we need something of the self-reliance and the gay spirit of adventure that marked the old settlers who cut trees, plowed fields and pushed into new territories," said Senator Molson in an interview. "Sport can help provide this."

As a former hockey and football player at McGill University and a man who personally and through business has encouraged sport, Senator Molson feels that community interest is paramount.

**NEED PUBLIC INTEREST**

"The initiative must come from the people of the community. I can't help but feel it would be difficult for the federal government to do much until we have public interest."

"Sport is important, from the point of view of our country, in promoting health. There must be some active outlet for energy. Sport is just as important, in proportion, as food and schooling. It is a character builder and gives far more to youngsters than it takes from them."

Sensor Molson said sport is important also in preventing juvenile delinquency. Parents should encourage sport and the press could help by telling more about the activities in the lower echelons of sport.

Sensor Molson said big rinks and stadia would not be necessary in order to promote competition. If proper interest were developed, costs of equipment and travelling expenses for competition could be met through "some modest take in gate receipts" and through contributions.

No particular sport need be singled out, so long as youngsters were given the opportunity of playing, of learning rules of games and how to give and take.

## Emmet Kelly Will Have A Tough Audience In Brooklyn

NEW YORK (AP)—The way things are going veteran clown Emmet Kelly is going to have a pretty tough audience when he gets to Brooklyn. Dodgers fans are in no mood for laughing.

First there is the very live prospect of the Bums moving to Los Angeles in the not too distant future. And now, horror of horrors, Don Newcombe has a twinge in his elbow.

The second worry is of more immediate concern than the first. Brooklyn is sure of having the Bums around this year at least. It isn't sure it will have a healthy Newcombe, and without a healthy Newcombe the pennant chances take on a dull, forlorn look. Without his 27 victories in 1956 where would the Dodgers have finished?

Taking the role of a calamity howler, we can see that Newcombe's sore elbow is more serious than a similar complication involving another pitcher might be, in that it means he hasn't completely recovered from the injury suffered on the final day of the 1956 season.

Newcombe didn't reveal until he got to Tokyo on the Dodge Japan-tour that he suffered miseries in his right arm during the world series, and couldn't throw curves, a circumstance which made Yankees very happy indeed.

The first intimation he had a fragile wing was in May, 1954, when he went to a hospital in Milwaukee to see what was wrong with his elbow.

The fact the injury has recurred
