

Board Protests Hike In Freight And Ferry Rates

A resolution protesting the recent freight rate increase and the increase in Bowden ferry passenger rates was approved by the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade at their regular meeting in Alberton last night.

The board commended the Federal Government for its intended investigation of inequities in the freight rate structure and strongly requested early action to relieve the discrimination against the maritime area.

A second resolution, to the Provincial Department of Highways, urged 24-hour snow plow service

on the main highway between Tignish and O'Leary and Alberton, with suitable equipment to take care of any situation that might arise with special emphasis on the area between Elmsdale and Bloomfield.

Dr. George Dewar reported on the picnic site at Cane's Hill and was authorized by the board to continue investigation into the feasibility of establishing a park at Western Prince County. Following a discussion on daylight time a motion was passed approving a uniform time on P.E. Island.

Alton Rayner, O'Leary, was appointed chairman of a public affairs committee.

It was decided to encourage minor hockey and a committee comprised of Ed Turner, O'Leary and Ralph Gaudet Alberton, was appointed to draw up rules and regulations and make a recommendation to the board as to the age groups to be sponsored.

The meeting, held in the library was presided over by the president, Earle Atkinson. Minutes were read by the secretary-treasurer, C.R. Lead.

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DEMONSTRATE AT MISSILE BASE

Demonstrators held a mass meeting at Swaffham, Norfolk, England, in protest against the setting up of missile bases in Britain.

Will Continue To Lead Liberals Unless Ousted

Premier A. W. Matheson told the annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association in Summerside last night that if it is the wish of the Liberal Party he will continue to be its leader in the next Provincial election, but gave no indication as to when the election may be called.

The Premier said that rural electrification has been proceeding at the rate of 120 miles per year, and at the end of next year the program will be completed to the extent that almost all areas having at least four houses to the mile and seventy-five per cent of the homes as subscribers to the service, whose applications were filed before 1957 will be reached, and that there was hope that the applications received in the year 1957 would be looked after to a large extent.

In strong criticism of the recent 17 per cent increase in freight rates he called attention to the action of the Conservative Government in wiping out a 3.6 per cent hike prior to the federal election and allowing the recent increase, which he said would cost the people of this Province about \$2 million annually, and in effect take away the 2 1/2 million additional grant by which the Province had hoped to benefit from the Federal Government.

He assured the well attended meeting of about 150 persons that the province would have the benefits of a hospital insurance plan, but that the government were not going into the plant until they were prepared to cope with the problems that are involved.

He pledged that the first consideration of the Executive Committee of the third District includes John MacNutt, John Perry, and William
