C. W. L. Delegate Going To Rome

TORONTO (CP) — Mrs. F. A. Bussieres of Sillery, Que., national president of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, will be the only Canadian delegate to the congress of the World Union of Catholic Women's Organization to be held in Rome Sept. 29-Oct. 4.

Mrs. Bussieres will preside at two sessions of the North American Commission which will deal with problems of North American women. Recommendations, based on commission discussions, will be made to the WUCWO general assembly by Mrs. Bussieres.

Delegates from Senegal, the Cameroons, Madagascar, South Africa, India, Japan, Viet Nam, United States, Peru, Argentina and European countries will attend. The congress theme is "The mission of Catholic women in the modern world."

Highlighting discussions will be a forum on how WUCWO exercises its consultative status at the United Nations and in other international organizations.

Another topic on the agenda will be "the development of Christian personality in the adult woman." The delegates will consider specialized problems of adult education on all continents.

It is expected the Pope will receive the delegates on Oct. 5 and through them his blessing will extend to the 35,000,000 women grouped in the WUCWO.

His Holiness will be presented with a book in which names of CWL workers throughout the world are inscribed.

ROME (AP)—Ladies are belted again in the new Italian fashion coats for fall and winter. Large turtle necks are also shown to set off dainty throats. Although Italian fashion designers still are determined individualists, they have at least these common denominators in their showings for the new season.

The neckline, like a large, soft cuff or stretched-out turtle neck, is topping many a Rome creation. Belts are not only back, after seasons of high empire ribboning, but they're wider than before.

At Capucci's opening, the narrowest belt measured a good four inches, wrapped cummerbund-style at the normal waistline. That was modest compared to a two-foot wide martingale across the back of a slim cocktail sheath. None of the belts are buckled but pull through slots in the dress or suit. For evenings, full skirts are gathered in at the hemline. Jackets are brief, often ending in wide waistband binding.

adding more juice, if needed, to make a thick batter. Pour off fat in sausage pan. Drop batter over patties and spread carefully. Bake about 25 min. Turn out for serving. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

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Sprinkle in bottom of greased 8" square cake pan
1/4 c. chopped onions
Shape into 9 patties
1 lb. sausage meat
and arrange them over onion. Bake in a hot oven, 400°, 1/2 hour.
